Ignoring the general depression gossip, which has no fear for him and illustrating his faith in the present and future, Walter Leverette, well known Medford business man and moving picture theater owner with theaters already in Grants Pass, Ore., and Yreka, Calif., which he has operated for some time past, began the construction of his third new theatre in Weed, Calif., last Tuesday.

This will give him a chain of three moving picture theatres in a rather compact territory. Looking after the general operation of the State theater at Grants Pass and the Broadway theater in Yreka, together with his Medford business interests has kept Mr. Leverette moving lively for a long time past, and with the new theater will keep him on a practically continuous hectic jump, to travel about between the four places. He has been putting in extra hours of hard work daily, as it is.

The new Weed theater, which will be the only first-class one in that lumber town on the other side of the Siskiyou, will be of the same design, architecture and construction, and 800 seating capacity, as his handsome Broadway theater at Yreka, only that it will be better in that new general ideas in theater building and equipment since the latter theater was built, will be incorporated in the Weed theater.
