FAIR HAS LOCAL RABBIT EXHIBITS

Although a slight decrease in the number of rabbit entries in the state fair at Salem was noted, southern Oregon's representation increased 50 per cent, according to members of the Southern Oregon Mutual Rabbit Breeders' association who attended the showing. Many prizes also went to growers of this district, it was reported.

The judges, V. C. Reeder of Kansas City, and Oscar Schultze of New York city, stated that the pelted Dutch and Himalayan breeds constituted the first collection they had ever seen. Mr. Reed also said that a notable shift from the larger to the smaller and fancier breeds was indicated in the exhibition.

Four-H boys and girls had a large number of rabbits entered, many of which were outstanding, according to reports. A heavyweight chinchilla, entered by Ray Anderson of Portland, was awarded the grand championship prize.

The display included a large amount of rabbit fur, and Mr. Schultze exhibited his collection of the new beaver-like Rex rabbit pelts which he brought from Germany.

DR. FUNK TO END PASTORATE HERE

After spending three years as pastor of the English Lutheran church in this city, Dr. Funk will retire from the active work of the local church on October 31.

The pastor and his wife will return to Glendale, Calif., where the doctor had charge of the First English Lutheran church for eight years. One of the beautiful church edifices for which that city is noted, was built under his leadership.

Dr. Funk will maintain an office in Glendale, and will continue his work in the ministry as a missionary at large, conducting special services and assisting pastors and congregations. He has taken an active part in the religious and social welfare work of Medford and is the retiring president of the Rogue River Valley Pastors' union. The Pacific Lutheran says, "He has won the respect and love of the pastors of the synod."

A congregational meeting will be held at the close of the morning service, Sunday, October 4, for the purpose of calling a new pastor.
