The Athletics have outscored the Cardinals in advance of the world's series, in the matter of accumulating crumples. Whether it handicaps them is something else.

Every regular of the world's champions, with the notable exceptions of Lefty Grove and Rube Walberg, has been incapacitated at one time or another in the latter part of the season.

The only serious casualty in the Cardinal camp is the veteran right-hander, Jesse Joseph Haines, one of the best "one-game" pitchers in the business.

The injury to Jim Collins, young first baseman, can be overlooked in view of the comeback of Sunny Jim Bottomley at his old post.

With the possible exception of Joe Boley at shortstop, the A's will put their championship line-up on the field for the first time at St. Louis. Dibs Williams has played so well in the short field that he may get the call even if Boley is in shape again.

Connie Mack's reserves have exceeded his expectations. In fact, it is due to their ability and alacrity that the A's steamrolled all opposition at a time when they were beset by ailments and mishaps to the regular troops.

The club's performance, under difficulties, is one of the most remarkable in major league history and another potent reason why it will be favored to register three world's championships in a row.

Interesting news of this locality and other sections of Oregon is included in the following release from the Oregon State Game commission:

Nearly 3000 Chinese pheasants have been released this season by the Jackson County Game Protective association from its outdoor pheasant farm near Medford, according to H. L. Noblitt, secretary.

A total of 4300 eggs were received from the state game farms and a hatch of 2946 was secured under outdoor conditions with domestic hens. Most of these chicks were permitted to distribute naturally but 1100 of them were transported to various parts of Jackson county. The Ashland district including Griffin creek and Eagle Point received 634.

Holding pens for saving female pheasants until after the fall shooting are planned for next year. All of this Jackson county propagation work was done without expense to the game commission except the furnishing of eggs, and sportmen of that section are expecting exceptionally good shooting this season.

A drop of \$60,000 in total revenues of the Oregon state game commission from the high total of \$450,000 of last year, was recorded at the close of the department's fiscal year September 30, according to H. L. Moreland, chief clerk. Most of the 682 agents selling hunters' and anglers' licenses have responded promptly with their returns, but the total for 1931 will not exceed \$390,000.

Expenses have been curtailed in all departments, only the most essential work being continued and substantial savings have been made.

Activity of leading sportmen in each county to stimulate license sales is expected to partially offset the disastrous slump which threatens continuance of fish and game propagation work.

Lakes and streams of southern Oregon received the following trout stockings from the Klamath hatchery of the Oregon state game commission according to Matt L. Ryckman, superintendent of hatcheries: Eastern brook in Jackson creek, 1400; Miller lake, 22,400; Sky lake, 39,200; Malone springs, 20,000; Fremont creek, 1400; Royce creek, 22,400; Wickup springs, 22,400; Dead Horse lake, 18,000. Lake of the Woods received 88,000 rainbow trout.

Baker was injured in the St. Mary's game and still was in civilian clothes when practice was held last night.

Coach Howard Jones is passing up drilling in blocking and line work to teach his men a few things about breaking up forward passes. Oregon State specializes in aerial attack and Jones is endeavoring to build up a defense against that line of attack.

Battle Scarred Buck Bagged By Hunter in Tejon

YREKA, Calif., Oct. 1.—(Spl.) Survive of previous seasons, a forked-horn buck with one foreleg shot off below the knee and a bullet hole through its ear, was bagged by a hunter in the Santa Barbara national forest. According to a report from the Tejon ranger station the deer was in fine condition with plenty of fat. The crippled leg was still flexible at the knee joint and the end was calloused showing that it had at it been useful.

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MOST POPULAR THROUGHOUT THE WORLD

KAPLAN INJURES DR. SARPOLIS BY FALL ON CHEST

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 1.—(AP)—Abe Kaplan, Montreal heavyweight wrestler, defeated Dr. Karl Sarpolis, Cleveland, by default here last night when Sarpolis was injured and unable to continue after Kaplan had taken the first and only fall in 7 minutes 45 seconds with a series of flying wristlocks. After tossing Sarpolis over his shoulder several times, Kaplan came down heavily on the latter's chest. Sarpolis started vomiting blood and physicians who examined him said he had probably burst a blood vessel. Sarpolis, who himself holds a medical degree, was plainly worried over his condition and declined to return to the mat.

Casey O'Dale, Columbus, O., and Pat McKay, Memphis, treated the fans to one of the liveliest heavyweight clashes seen here in months. It was called a draw after each had taken one fall at the end of five rounds.

McKay took the first fall with a series of rabbit punches and head scissors. O'Dale evened matters with a crab hold.

Basanta Singh and Vic Potter, welterweights, wrestled three rounds to a draw.

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 1.—(AP) Oregon is taking no chances with Idaho. This is most evident as Doc Spears, head coach, pounds away at his foot-ball squad here, sending them to their showers only when dusk begins to spread.

Moeller is expected to start as quarterback in the Idaho game at Portland Saturday. Joe Lillard is placed for left half, and Rotenberg will be at right. Either Mikulak or Fosco will get the call at full.

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Superior Beings In Other Worlds Is Bishop's Belief

LONDON, Oct. 1.—(AP)—Dr. E. W. Barnes, bishop of Birmingham, told the British Association for the Advancement of Science today he believes there are other worlds than ours inhabited by beings superior to man who even now probably are sending messages to the earth.

"I have no doubt," said the bishop, who is one of the leading theologians of England, "that there are many

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other inhabited worlds and that on some of them exist beings immeasurably beyond our mental level. It would be rash to deny that they can now."

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
