

ASHLAND NORMAL SHOWS INCREASE FOR FALL TERM

360 Enrolled Churchill Announces—64 More Than Last Year—Homecoming Dates October 30 and 31

SOUTHERN OREGON STATE NORMAL SCHOOL, Oct. 2.—(Spl.)—Three hundred and sixty students have enrolled at the Southern Oregon State Normal school for the fall term, President J. A. Churchill has announced. This is an increase of 64 students over the fall term of last year, and is also an increase over the year before.

Of the number, 131 men have registered. Many are taking the junior college work here, which will enable them to enter any standard college and university with full junior standing after taking two years here.

There are approximately 200 new students, coming from all parts of the state.

Homecoming will be held on Friday and Saturday, October 30 and 31, at which time the SONS will play the Eastern Oregon Normal school. This is the first game with the easterners.

Harry Rice, president of the student body, and Weldon T. Hibbard, vice-president, will appoint committees for the homecoming events. The first student body meeting will be held on Friday morning, at which time the organization will be completed.

The first football game of the fall will be in Ashland on Friday, October 9, with the Humboldt State Teachers' college.

Scarlet tinted toe nails and ash hair will be something for socially proper people to worry about at the winter resort beaches this season, Kathleen Howard, fashion expert, predicted today.

Bathing suits, Miss Howard told the fashion group, an organization of stylists and fashion writers, are to be "nuder and nuder." The one-piece, knitted suit, she has advised in cablegrams from Paris, is a favorite beach garment shown there.

The wind-blown hair, bob cut square at the back is blonde if possible, and the mode is available to all women who know the art of applying white henna to their auburn or raven locks, Miss Howard pointed out.

Smart women at Monte Carlo still are wearing pajamas mostly of knitted materials and tweeds. These have matching hats, trimmed with bright feathers.

Divided skirts are a new mode for women playing golf.

Pajamas for evening wear have given away to more décolleté evening gowns.

Hats continue small and are tilted more than ever on one side of the head. Most of them have a high trim in the back to give height to the wearer of the new square-shouldered costumes and the huge, wide fur collars. The trim is usually

a quill or two, or a stiff velvet or robbin effect.

One Parisian designer is featuring entire hats of feathers and small beads with felt bows. The cap with a visor such as Mayor Jimmy Walker wears, is another favorite, and little felts with brims turned up all the way around, Breton-wise, are adored on petite wearers.

Blue, featured in the late fall openings, will carry through to spring, Margaret Case, fashion magazine writer, predicted. But blue is expected to be a dark horse in leading seasonal colors.

A stylist from a woolen concern reported that the Spanish tile color is going as well as black, or brown. Another expert said it was a close runner-up to black, which has been hailed as the season's leading color.

Miss Case said two silhouettes prevail. These are the trim silhouette featured in suits and coats with high buttoning and wide shoulders, and the trimmed silhouette with a loose effect, wide armholes, and much fur trimming. These same silhouettes are noted in evening wear, namely the sheath-like gown and the gowns with bulk in the back and considerable trimming.

California cream producers were benefitting today from an upturn in prices that has been in progress since midsummer. Butterfat was bringing 33½ cents—the highest price since the first week of January.

Today's price compared with the low of the year—23 cents—showed a marked recovery. This came largely from depletion of surplus supplies, due to low butter prices.

Butter prices have followed cream into higher levels, although not keeping pace.
