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OAKLAND OUSTED AS CONTENDER IN FLAG SCRAMBLE

Double Loss To Angels Brings End To Hopes—Beavers Profit By Yde's Wildness—Beat Hollies.

(By the Associated Press) Los Angeles, Oct. 2.—(AP)—Los Angeles, out itself as far as winning the second half of the coast league season goes, eliminated Oakland last night by taking both games of a doubleheader.

Oakland was defeated by scores of 8-4 and 3-0. Burns, Angel first baseman, was the hitting star in the first game with two doubles and a single. With the way cleared, San Francisco advanced further toward winning the season's second half by defeating Seattle 3-1 for the Sea's third straight victory.

Emil Yde, Hollywood pitcher, was generous to the Portland Beavers, walking ten of them in his seven and two-thirds innings on the mound, which with a few hits the Beavers got enabled them to take the game 10-5. The Duck's eight hits were so blended with Yde's passes that they netted scores consistently.

Sacramento stepped ahead in the final series with the Mission Reds by winning last night's game 8-2. Wild pitching by Caster of the Missions, presented the Senators with several of their runs.

INVITING HOOVER OLYMPIC GAMES

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 12. (AP)—President Hoover will be personally presented with a hand painted and embossed invitation to the Olympic games here next summer.

The invitation, signed by Governor Ralph, Mayor John G. Porter, and William M. Garland, president of the organizing committee of the games, will be turned over to Louis B. May, a personal friend of the president at a luncheon today, to be delivered in person. It is on sheepskin, bound in red leather.

ARMY-NAVY FOOTBALL PROPOSAL IS STUDIED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2. (AP)—A proposal for a renewal of the Army-Navy football classic in a post-season game for charity was referred today to Rear Admiral Hart, superintendent of the naval academy by Secretary Adams.

One of the laws is to the effect that no person who has killed a person while hunting may ever hunt again in Oregon and possession of a hunting license does not restate the right to carry firearms.

Records of the state game department are being checked to see that no hunting licenses are issued to persons who have killed others while hunting, but even if a license is issued, those persons are violating section 72-103 Oregon Code 1930, which prohibits them from carrying firearms.
