Billy Leever Fourth in State Fair Competition—Hazel Stager Wins Third Place in Club Girls' Division

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 2. — (AP) — Twelve counties with 21 entrants competed in the health contest in which David L. Smith, Portland, placed first for boys, and Barbara Enschede, Washington county, first for girls at the state fair.

Young Smith, son of Dr. and Mrs. L. Howard Smith, has been a member of a growth and health club for three years. David has been a steady drinker of milk and his mother says that they have emphasized a balanced diet and adequate rest.

Barbara Enschede, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William A. Enschede, Hillsboro farmers, says she has had a cup of milk each day as long as she can remember, that she eats all kinds of fruits and vegetables and goes to bed at 8 o'clock each night. She never eats candy between meals, except when she goes to a party.

Tom Bronleewe of Washington county, was second in the boys' division, with Kenneth Klingner of Morrow county third; Billy Leever of Jackson county fourth, and Homer Townsend, Multnomah county, fifth.

Mildred Link of Columbia county was second in the girls' division, with Hazel Stager of Jackson county third; Anna Jane Jacobsen, Tillamook county fourth, and Roberta Schrupp of Clackamas county fifth.

EXPLOSION REVEALS STILL IN RESIDENCE

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 2. — (AP) — Mrs. Amy Mossa, 50, died in a hospital here today from burns and injuries received last night in a terrific gas explosion which wrecked a residence and exposed a large liquor still in the rear of the house.

Mrs. George Hansen, 45, was critically burned and an unidentified man was said to have been slightly injured.

The three left in an automobile before police arrived. Hospital attendants said the man brought the two women to them for care and then left.

GRIND COAST WHEAT FOR CHINESE RELIEF

PORTLAND, Oct. 2. — (AP) — One-half of the farm board's sale of 15,000,000 bushels of northwest wheat to China will be ground into flour by northwest mills.

Millers of the Pacific northwest states agreed to this proposal of the grain stabilization corporation here yesterday and now await definite grinding orders.

The wheat will go into the flood-stricken regions of China, where suffering is acute.

Baker Relief Fund Passes \$3000 Goal

BAKER, Ore., Oct. 2. — (AP) — The drive for the unemployment relief fund here went well beyond the \$3000 goal, Louis Levinger, chairman of the committee, announced today. Cash in the bank totals \$3,267.50, and pledges including \$4 from each school teacher in the city, amount to \$295, a total of \$3,562.50.

The money will be used to employ local labor on city projects during the winter. The city of Baker will match the money given by its citizens.

Work, Not Charity, Is Recommendation

CHICAGO, Oct. 2. — (AP) — The sub-committee on employment plans and suggestions submitted a report to President Hoover's unemployment commission today, recommending that "all work now available be equitably distributed among those normally employed," suggesting that relief be in the form of work rather than charity and recommending that "red tape" be cut so that legitimate public works could be accelerated.

BISHOPS LIGHTEN MARRIAGE CANON EPISCOPAL FAITH

Touch of Liberalism Seen in Proposal — Divorced Persons May Have Blessing on New Marriage

DENVER, Colo., Oct. 2. — (AP) — Divisive votes having settled virtually every controversial issue before the fifth triennial convention of the Protestant Episcopal church, delegates prepared to wind up their business today and adjourn two weeks after the opening of the convocation.

The convention adopted a new matrimonial canon, tinged with liberalism and representing the first drastic changes in the rules of the church on marriage and divorce since 1808. Approval of the canon, a compromise between the house of bishops and the house of clerical and lay deputies, came only after several hectic days of debate. Liberals and conservatives marshaled their forces at the beginning of the convention and for a time it appeared the fight would end in a deadlock and the entire question would have to be referred to the next convention.

Persons who have been divorced and remarried in contravention to the law of the church are given cognizance in the new canon. With the approval of ecclesiastical courts, operating through the bishops of the several dioceses and missionary districts, such persons may retain their communicant status and be admitted to baptism, confirmation and holy communion.

The canon also provides that the bishops and ecclesiastical courts recognize adultery as a cause for dissolution or annulment after marriage. The innocent party to a divorce granted on grounds of adultery may be married by a minister of the church, with approval of the bishop.

Three Day Notice The canon provides for pre-marriage instruction by ministers, who may not perform the solemnization service, unless they have been notified of the intent of the parties to marriage three days in advance.

On prohibition and unemployment, the convention declined to take decisive action. Both the house of deputies and the house of bishops, in an adopted committee report, admitted a widespread difference of opinion of the wisdom and desirability of retaining the Eighteenth Amendment and consequent legislation in their present form.

Talks To Parents

Over-Protection (By Alice Judson Peale)

Years ago I knew a family in which there were two little girls who looked as though they had stepped straight out of a fairy tale.

They had great shining eyes, softly curling hair, delicate features and tenderly rounded cheeks.

They lived in the depths of an estate where they could wander from morning till night and find nothing more sordid than a patch of anemones blooming in the spring woods or Christmas ferns against a bank.

They did their lessons at home with a governess; the music and dancing teachers came to the house. The only other children they ever saw were visiting cousins and the children of their mother's friends.

Both little girls were extremely intelligent, and their academic advancement, their accomplishments, even their creative originality had suffered nothing from the rarefied atmosphere in which they were being brought up.

Yet looking at these happy exquisite children, one could not help but wonder whether meeting the inevitable realities of life would not prove too much for them.

That hardly one child in a hundred thousand is thus delicately nurtured is due to the fact that only a very few parents have the necessary wealth.

Many parents, if they could have their way, would thus protect their children from everything rude, in-seemly, and disillusioning.

Many actually do go a long way in this direction, even though they must bring up their children in an ordinary environment.

Children are much better prepared to meet an imperfect world if the experiences of their childhood make them hit by bit familiar with such things as dishonesty, vulgarity, aggressiveness, and cruelty.

Only by learning to adjust themselves to these elements in human nature while they are yet young will they be able successfully to meet their impact.

Sons of Earls Run Off in U. S. Style
