JAPANESE PLANES BOMB CHINESE IN MILITARY CAMPS

Reports Say Nipponese Occupy Newchang, Strategic Point On Railroad—Grip On Area Unrelaxed

SHANGHAI, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Japanese fighting planes reportedly bombed concentrations of either Chinese troops or bandits in the neighborhood of Mukden, Manchuria, today.

Advices from the theater of the Sino-Japanese controversy also said Japanese troops had occupied Newchang, strategic point on a branch line of the Japanese operated South Manchurian railway.

Both Japanese and Chinese press dispatches agreed that the Japanese military was not relaxing its grip on the occupied zones of Manchuria.

Japanese reports asserted the troop movements were provoked by widespread lawlessness in southern Manchuria, but the Chinese countered with the statement that the Japanese were responsible for such conditions because their occupation of the areas in question had destroyed the machinery for the maintenance of order.

CHANGCHUN, Manchuria, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Reuters News Agency reported today that Japanese airplanes had bombed and destroyed Chinese barracks at Pashan-Chengste, on the Mukden-Hailung railway. Yesterday after they had been fired on by Chinese troops estimated to number 6000. The casualties were estimated at 200. Sixty bombs were dropped.

AMERICAN FLIERS HOP FROM JAPAN

SAMUSHIRO, Japan, Oct. 4.—(Sunday)—(AP)—Clyde Pangborn and Hugh Herndon, American pilots, took off from Tokyo today (5:01 p. m. Saturday E.S.T.) on a nonstop trans-Pacific flight from Japan to the United States.

They planned to fly at least to Seattle, 4465 miles. If their gasoline held out they intended to continue to Salt Lake City, Utah, via Wenatchee, Wash., and Boise, Idaho. A total of 5208 miles and break the world record of 5011 miles.

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Cecil Allen and Don Moyle, California aviators, hopped off at noon today for Tacoma, Wash., via White Horse, Yukon. Weather reports were that conditions were favorable.

HANKOW, China, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Carrying Colonel and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh and their monoplane, which was damaged yesterday when it capsized on the Yangtze river, throwing the flying couple into the water, the British aircraft carrier Hermes sailed today for Shanghai.

Questioned about the accident, Lindbergh laughed it off as a minor affair, saying:

"The plane was not seriously damaged. We expect it to be a simple matter to repair her at Shanghai."

HOLD GRAIN FOR RISE IN PRICE, IS SLOGAN

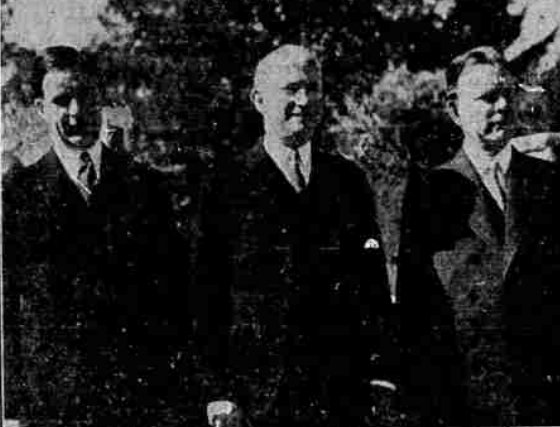

NEGRO MURDERER SHOT IN CELL BY VICTIM'S BROTHER

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Oct. 3.—(AP)—A moment after Miss Nell Williams, society girl, reaffirmed identification of a negro held as the slayer of her sister and another girl in a mountain holdup, he was shot down in the jail by her brother, Dent Williams.

The shooting came as a dramatic climax to an inquiry Assistant Solicitor J. M. Long was conducting at the prison last night in the presence of members of the Williams family.

Today the negro, Willie Peterson, 34, was in a critical condition at a hospital here while city and county officers stood guard with riot guns to prevent possible disorder.

Peterson was arrested September 23 when Miss Williams pointed him out on the street as the negro who held up her automobile August 4, shot her and fatally wounded her sister, Augusta, and a friend, Miss Jennie Wood, after keeping them captive several hours on a lonely mountain road.

MRS. COLLINGS FAILS IDENTIFY SUSPECTS

ARGENTINA CUTS LUXURY BUYING BY TARIFF RULE

Warehouses Bulge With Autos, Radios As Revolutionary Government Tries To Halt Extravagance.

BUENOS AIRES, Oct. 3.—The warehouses of Buenos Aires are bulging with automobiles, radios, electric refrigerators, phonographs, power farm machinery and kindred imports sufficient to fill Argentina's needs for some three years.

The stocks represent the efforts of manufacturers, largely in the United States, to cope with a tariff policy under which the Argentine government, in order to obtain a favorable balance of trade, is curtailing the expenditures of its citizens for imported "luxuries."

Stiles Trade Balance
When the revolutionary government came into power a year ago it found Argentina spending more than it earned. In 1930, with a rather poor harvest, the country bought goods worth \$45,000,000 more than it got for produce sold abroad.

The government could hardly increase the nation's earnings, for the staple exports are grain and meat on which the producer does not set the price and the production of which cannot be stimulated in one year or two. But it could and did attack the unfavorable trade balance by curtailing the nation's shopping habit.

Climaxing months of experiment designed to bring income above outgo, the government put into effect on September 1 a new basis of import valuations aimed at reducing the unfavorable trade balance by keeping Argentina from spending so much abroad.

Such Imports As Motor Cars, Electric Refrigerators and Radios had been assessed 32 per cent duty on rather haphazard valuations. Under the new decree valuations are set according to weight. The duties remain generally around 32 per cent, but their amount trends sharply upward.

Argentina has sold a much larger quantity of produce abroad this year than in 1930, but prices of meat and grain have been much lower. Nonetheless the monetary value of Argentina's exports is only 2.7 per cent less in 1931 than it was in 1930, while the value of its imports has been reduced by 25 per cent.

He had been missing since Thursday when he went into the heavily timbered country to hunt. His dog was standing guard over the body. Lonkey had lived in Oregon since 1878.

SLAYER CONVICTED IN OKLAHOMA COURT

NEW YORK, Okla., Oct. 3.—(AP)—A district court jury convicted Earl Quinn, former Missouri convict, today for the murder late last December of Jesse and Zedie Griffith, Blackwell sisters, who were brutally slain while returning to their schools from a Christmas vacation at home.

Quinn was sentenced to life in prison. The youth repudiated his confession while being brought here yesterday. A preliminary investigation yesterday indicated that he could not have been responsible for the revolting murder.

WIDOW OF LENIN FIGHTING ON FOR WOMEN'S RIGHTS

MOSCOW, Oct. 3.—A fighter by her husband's side up from czarist oppression, through the dark days of revolution and the difficult years of reconstruction, Nadejda Konstantinovna Krupskaya, widow of Lenin, carries on as Red Russia's most militant feminist leader.

Like her contemporaries in the United States and England, hers was a role of pioneering for women's rights, but under much more hazardous conditions. She was faced in other countries during the early days of the suffrage movement.

Demanded Freedom

She wanted not only equal political rights for women. She demanded also freedom from what she called "domestic slavery."

The first goal has been attained for her in any phase of the new Russian life. She has lived to see the young socialist state making progress toward achievement of the second.

Even before the revolution, Krupskaya's battle cry was: "Down with domestic work! Down with illiteracy!"

At 62, those phrases still form the keystone of her philosophy.

Childless herself, although known as "grandmother" to all Russia, she has been always an enemy of such "unproductive" work as cooking, washing and child rearing.

She has been instead a vigorous advocate of communal dining halls, laundries, sewing factories, nurseries and kindergartens so that women would be free to take active parts in industry.

ASK LIMITATION SHORT SALES ON STOCK EXCHANGE

U. S. Chamber Commerce Would Hold Selling to Actual Possessors Stock—Would Admit Orientals

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—(AP)—A resolution urging the New York stock exchange to take steps to limit short selling of stock and bonds was adopted today by the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

The resolution said that such sales be prohibited except by those who have actual possession of such securities or those who deposit 40 per cent of the sale value in cash and give evidence of possession of the remainder."

Legitimate marketing of securities would not be interfered with.

National planning to keep production and consumption balanced is favored by many business leaders as a preventive of depressions.

The idea is embodied in a report which a committee of the chamber, headed by Henry I. Harriman of Boston, has given to the chamber's board of directors for approval.

Another committee has told the directors it would "remove a cause of irritation" if Japan, China and other far eastern countries were placed on an immigration quota basis. The discrimination against the Japanese, it said, has handicapped American trade.

PORTLAND MILK WAR IN OFFING

WARS and rumors of wars in Portland's milk trade took a new aspect here today when dairies filed wholesale tariffs with the city milk division and one of the largest distributors posted a price of 6 cents wholesale for 4 per cent milk.

This was regarded as the first outspoken challenge in what may develop into a new price war.

Rabbi Henry J. Berkowitz, milk arbitrator here, said that he feels the idea of selling milk at 6 cents, below the cost of production and distribution, "will react to the detriment of the companies which have gone under the others in the price schedule."

Fascism Council For Arms Limit Debt Settlement

ROME, Oct. 3.—(AP) Limitation of armaments and settlement of war debts and reparations were advocated by the grand council of fascism today as the most effective remedies for world-wide depression.

GLASGOW POLICE GET UPPER HAND IN JOBLESS RIOT

Order Restored After Two Nights of Violence—Great Stocks of Food Carried Away From Looted Shops

GLASGOW, Scotland, Oct. 3.—(AP)—The most vindictive rioting and looting in years, extending intermittently over two nights and a day, came to a climax early today when police swept the streets clean and restored order.

Beginning about 8:30 last night, the battle between jobless men demonstrating against dole reductions and the forces of the law raged for more than six hours. An undetermined number of rioters and several police were injured and upwards of 100 arrests were made.

The mobs began when police charged a body of about 100 men who were holding a manifestation outside the jail, in which John McGovern, labor M. P., and his lieutenants were being held for Thursday night's outbreak. Almost simultaneously trouble started in the Glasgow, Glasgow Cross and other sections of the city.

Far outnumbered, the police tried on foot and horseback to disperse the mobs. They charged time and again with loaded batons and the rioters replied with hatchets, hammers and makeshift weapons of every description. A variety of missiles thrown from neighboring houses added to the uproar.

Stores Looted.

As fast as the demonstrators were driven off the main streets, they darted into alleys and formed for renewed attacks. Throughout the night and early hours they broke into countless shops and carried away great stocks of food and other merchandise. The damage was estimated at thousands of pounds and the loss in foodstuffs was considered incalculable.

The police finally got the upper hand. Scores of marauders were dragged into police stations, blood streaming from their wounds. A few went to hospitals and hundreds nursed battered heads and broken limbs within the privacy of their homes.
