

BUSINESS AWAITS SELF-CONFIDENCE ASSERTS LAMONT

Underlying Soundness of America Is Stressed by Partner of Morgan-Pessimism Carried Too Far

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—(AP)—The "underlying soundness of the American situation" was stressed by Thos. W. Lamont, partner of J. P. Morgan & Company, in a speech discussing business and industrial recovery, his said, "It remains for the community to utilize these elements. Our people must regain confidence in themselves, in the underlying strength of our American institutions."

The role, he continued, may be the method of meeting unemployment in some countries, "but it is not the American way."

Time Will Cure
Time, he said, will cure some of the ills of the current business depression. Concerning unemployment, he warned that unless "through private efforts we do our part to relieve the situation, we shall inevitably load all the burden upon the state. This, he said, is a situation not to be desired."

He criticized rumor mongers who predict misfortune "that never will happen." Optimism was carried to absurd heights two years ago, he said, while "now pessimism is being carried to unreasoning and fantastic depths."

Resources Ignored
"Many persons ignore completely the underlying soundness of the American situation. No country in the world is blessed with so many natural resources as ours."

There is no royal road to recovery. But in a state of unreasonable apprehension or fear it will never arrive. It is high time once and for all for us to take courage, not of our fears but of our reason."

Mr. Lamont spoke at a meeting of 250 financiers and business leaders constituting the general committee of the emergency unemployment relief organization.

DAIRY PRODUCTS SHOW STRENGTH IN COAST MARKETS

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 3.—(AP)—Strength in the general dairy products market continues locally as well as in most centers along the Pacific coast with a like situation reflected in the country generally. The business of overproduction and surplus is fast disappearing in the trade and especially so for butter.

Market for butterfat reflects the strength of the general butter market trend.

There was no change in the general selling price for eggs. Demand was favorable even though an increase in the supply is reflected for the week to date.

While general buying prices for heavy hens was not above 18c per pound, one firm was out with a card for immediate delivery at 20c per pound.

Very low potato prices are ruling at all points.

SHEEP 4517. There was practically no change in the prices of sheep and lambs during the week. Good to near choice lambs scaled \$3.00-3.25, including some clipped stuff. In between sorts sold \$4.00-4.75 with thin stock \$3.50 less. Medium to choice yearlings were \$3.00-4.00, with bull to choice ewes \$1.00-2.50.
