WORLD DAREDEVIL, HUNTER, DANCER, AFTER ROGUE FISH

From "The Bill Topper" of London, the sensation of the Biarritz—"sound" has delivered him to the sparkling waters of the Rogue, down which he guides sportsmen in search of steelhead. They know him as Bud Snyder of the Age of Speed.

"I knew it was time to get out," he stated yesterday when in this city to announce that he's going to give tap dancing lessons. "Some tried to linger on but I saw my game go out of the lights, when the first sound picture went in."

Through the leading music halls of England, before African kings, he rode to glory on his gleaming bicycle. On it, the London Daily Express of a good many years back, reports he performed the most spectacular feat of all times. He rode it through leaps and bounds and when the bow vibrates, who inhabit the world's brightest amusement houses became almost accustomed to the act, he invented the somersaulting automobile.

Each act was followed by a greater thrill and then the sensational: presentations were faced with an even more sensational finale, the sound picture.

And fate was not through with "The Bill Topper." The voice of Anne Alexia, which accompanied him in all the feats of the brightest days was silenced by death.

"She was just four feet, eleven," Mr. Snyder explained yesterday, speaking of his wife. "She was a coloratura soprano and she had the greatest breath control the stage has known. She was too small for the volume of her voice."

Bidney Cohen was manager of Snyder's act in the old days. He did his last work for Pantages with the Orpheum.

He came to southern Oregon about three years ago to follow his second best profession, "fishing." It's not nearly so exciting as hunting elephants in Africa but his grand sport, he declared yesterday. And now that he's decided to teach dancing too, he feels he can satisfy his feet, which have never become reconciled to the change from stage to river rocks.

70 DAYS DROUGHT ENDED BY LIGHT SEPTEMBER RAIN

"Following a short period of excessively warm weather for the first five days of the month a welcome rain storm brought relief and terminated the 10 days drought in the Medford area," says W. J. Hutchinson, head of the Medford weather bureau in his monthly meteorological notes for September just past, and then continues on as follows: "Three days of cool showery weather did much to freshen vegetation and clear a smoky dry atmosphere. Rainfall during this storm totaled one inch and under normal conditions this amount would have been of considerable benefit to the valley. However, due to the prolonged drought immediately preceding, soil moisture had become entirely depleted and the parched ground rapidly absorbed the rain with actual need for more. During the balance of the month moderate fall weather prevailed, being broken by light rains on the 18th, 19th, and 28th.

"Temperatures for September averaged about normal. The maximum occurred on the second day when the thermometer registered a high point of 101 degrees. Minimum readings averaged 45.8 degrees with the lowest temperature recorded at 38 degrees on the 24th, making an absolute range in temperature of 63 degrees.

"Total precipitation amounted to 1.23 inches, being in excess of the monthly normal by .71 inches. The greatest 24-hour rainfall, .30 inches, accumulated on the 8th when a fairly steady fall, beginning in the early hours of the morning, continued, broken only for short intervals, until midnight.
