Clark, manager of the hotel. Pangborn brought an extra suit of underwear and a shirt.

New landing gear for the plane was ordered from New York by telephone by Herndon.

The fliers were welcomed in the name of the state of Washington by Lieutenant Governor J. A. Gellatly, whose home is here.

"We each snuggled a little, sitting up in our plane," Pangborn said. They both took baths at the hotel in preparation for their first good sleep in two days.

"My heart went into my mouth when the engine stopped at the east end of the Alaskan gulf," said Herndon. "We didn't expect the tank to go dry at the time. The engine stopped, started again a couple of times before finally coming to a full stop."

He said they had to descend several thousand feet to make the change.

Pangborn was at the controls when they landed and did most of the piloting on the trip.

"We became deaf and deaf and had to write notes to each other in order to communicate, although we sat side by side," he said.

Pangborn said he ate two chicken legs and a piece of cheese and drank hot tea with caffeine tablets in it to keep him awake. Herndon's diet was light, too, he said. They had a considerable quantity of food left in the plane when they landed.

Within 35 minutes a reception committee took the fliers in hand, and they left the field by automobile to find a hotel for much needed sleep.

Before turning in, plans for another hop, a non-stop flight to Dallas, Texas, to win an additional \$25,000 prize, were announced by the men.

A new landing gear and a new propeller will be necessary, they said, but in about 10 days they will be ready to leave for the Texas city.

Before finally turning in, Pangborn admitted they had gotten "awfully sleepy" during the last hours of the long flight.

Bride Phones Herndon. Within a short time a telephone call from Herndon's bride, whom he married shortly before the men started from New York on their attempted race around the world to beat the record of Wiley Post and Harold Gatty, was received here, before Herndon finally began to "make up" his much needed rest.

The biggest thrill of the flight, the fliers said, occurred when their engine stopped after they had flown about 3000 miles. They realized after a moment that the cause was the draining of one gas tank, and they quickly switched to another in time to get the motor going again.

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COMPLEX FIGHT ON FARM BOARD FACES CONGRESS

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The new congress promises a highly incongruous attitude toward the farm board.

There is an element, epitomized by Senator Reed, Republican of Pennsylvania, which decries the board as a failure and suggests legislation ranging from elimination of the farm board to repeal of the agricultural marketing act.

Another, and for the moment, a more powerful group, insists that the board be retained in toto with certain specific changes in the law it administers.

The latter includes co-operative marketing associations affiliated with the huge government-financed national marketing agencies and powerful farm service organizations.

Board "on the spot" How complex a situation may develop is seen in the probability of contemporary bills, both to strengthen and weaken the farm board.

Senator Brookhart, Iowa Republican, is expected to renew his campaign to turn over to the farm board the powers and functions of the federal farm loan board.

Colleagues in the view that centralization of marketing and production credit might facilitate farm financing suggest that it might be enough to give the farm board control of federal intermediate credit banks.

It all adds down to the paradoxical prospect of the legislative hopper holding at one and the same time bills which would do away with the farm board entirely, and others which would give it wider authority.

Of one thing there is virtual certainty. When the bill begins to grind the nation and its duly elected will come face to face with the fact that whether its stabilization of wheat and cotton is liked or not, the farm board is the fiscal agent of the government.

Must Collect Loans. It is the sole source accountable for the \$500,000,000 revolving fund. It alone is responsible for and equipped to collect the millions of dollars lent co-operative marketing groups over the length and breadth of the land.

After the younger officer left the civilian asked the older officer to tell him the rule.

"Don't take yourself so darned seriously," was the reply.

"I thought it an excellent rule and asked him what the others were," related Mr. Morrow. "If you follow that one you don't need any others," he told me."

Inherited Brains. Mr. Morrow's achievements in professional life, business, diplomacy and practical politics sprang from an intellectual heritage, but a background of decidedly moderate worldly possessions.

His father, Prof. James M. Morrow, was president of Marshall college at Huntington, W. Va., when his second son was born there on January 11, 1873. The mother was Clara Johnson Morrow, reared on an Ohio farm but known to her girlhood neighbors as "literary" because of the number of books she read and because she was a champion speller.

They named their second son for Prof. William Dwight Whitney of Yale, author of a famous English grammar.

The future diplomat finished his ordinary schooling at Allegheny, Pa., where his father had become a teacher in the high school. He worked his way through Amherst college, winning the degree of bachelor of arts in 1895.

Then he turned to the study of law and after four years struggle with scant finances, graduated with an LL.B. degree from Columbia university in 1899.

He got himself a job as law clerk with the firm of Simpson, Thacher & Bartlett in New York, persuading them that he was worth \$80 a month to start. Six years later he was a member of the firm and nine years after that, in 1914, he transferred his allegiance to finance and became a partner in J. P. Morgan & Company.

With that famous house he specialized in international loans, spending considerable time in Cuba and also devoting attention to the increased European business that followed the outbreak of the World war.

In these activities he displayed not only keen commercial sagacity but also qualities of tact, sympathy and understanding that marked him as a leader in business diplomacy.
