

JUNIOR GRIDMEN MEET GLENDALE HERE SATURDAY

Tigers Journey to Eureka—
Ashland Invades K. F. for
Dedication Game—Ore-
gon-Husky Tilt Interests

Southern Oregon football interest the coming Saturday will be centered at Eureka, Cal., where Medford high school plays the Eureka high school at Klamath Falls, where Ashland will be the opponent for the dedication of the new Klamath Falls athletic field, and at Seattle, where the University of Oregon, with at least one former Medford star in the lineup, plays the University of Washington.

Medford junior high will play the Glendale high school at Vancouver field as the offering for the home-staying fans.

The Medford squad will leave Friday noon for Eureka by special bus, and two full teams will make this trip. A number of local students and citizens will accompany the team to the coast city.

Hughes Only Gripples.
The Medford squad came out of the Marshfield game with no serious injuries, except to Old Hughes' shoulder. That valuable end will be out of the running for a couple of weeks. Rae or Bennett will take his place. The squad is being put through a stiff course of sprouts this week for the Eureka game. The last practice will be Thursday.

The Ashland-Klamath Falls game will be the most important of the Southern Oregon conference, and the first conference game for Ashland. Klamath Falls last Saturday, in its first conference contest, defeated Grants Pass, 19-12. Grants Pass made all its scores in the last half and Klamath Falls did all their scoring in the first half, with an aerial attack.

Pelicans Confident.
The Pelicans are laying great plans for the Ashland game, which they expect to win. The team averages 170 pounds, according to the publicity, and this week they are drilling with a ghost ball.

Coch Blum of Ashland shifted his backfield around against Dunsen last Saturday, and scored 21 points. The Lithians have been polishing up all season for Klamath Falls, with games against Weed, Yreka and Dunsen. Over 2500 people are expected to attend the game, which will be a sort of civic event for Klamath Falls.

For the next three Saturdays the Medford team plays away from home. Saturday, October 17, they play Grants Pass, and the following Saturday they go to Klamath Falls. Armistice day they journey to Bend, and that will end their football rambling for this year.

NORMAL SCHOOL HEAD CENSURED BY STATE BOARD

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 7.—(AP)—The state board of higher education voted to censure President J. S. Landers of the Oregon Normal school at Monmouth, late yesterday, by unanimous action. The board also accepted all but one paragraph of the extensive report of its special committee charged with investigation of school affairs at the Monmouth Normal after charges of incompetency and inefficient administration had been made against Landers through Governor Julius L. Meier.

The board, however, rejected the recommendation to accept President Landers' resignation.

The board censure, as stated in the committee report was: "Error in judgment in allowing a student to remain in school after pleading guilty to a serious charge. For misleading the state superintendent of public instruction by certifying in six cases that students had completed the required courses in the school when in fact they had finished the courses but were deficient by from two to 18 points of the requirements for graduation, which they were allowed to make up later."

Albert Burch of Medford, investigation committee member, voted to hold up action on Landers' resignation, and Starr, another member presiding as chairman, cast no vote.

HOT MAT BOUTS AWAIT GONG AT ARMORY TONIGHT

Wrestling fans of the city and valley will get their first helping in three months of their favorite sport at the Armory tonight at 8:15 o'clock, when Herb Owens starts his fall and winter campaign.

Bob Miller of Tacoma and Harold Helbert, University of Oregon law student, will be the combatants in the main event, and Basanta Singh, Hindu, and Vernon Clarke of Vancouver, Wash., will tangle in the special event. There will also be preliminary matches.

Miller and Helbert are wrestling a return match, after one of the hottest seasons ever staged in Eugene. They were originally scheduled to meet again in the university city, but the card was so good that Manager Owens thought he would open his local season with it. Both are fast, rough and aggressive, and one of the best matches in many months here is forecast.

Basanta Singh is no stranger to these parts. Ten years ago he was one of the main attractions when Gold Hill was the wrestling center of this section. Since then the Hindu has wrestled all over the world, and is a wily and experienced grappler.

Clarke, his opponent, is able to take care of himself. Manager Owens intends to stage a couple of wrestling bouts here within the next month, to find out whether or not local fans want the matches. If the attendance and interest justify, he will bring some of the leading mat men of the land here the coming fall and winter.

SOUTHERN DEMANDS BOLSTERS BUTTER

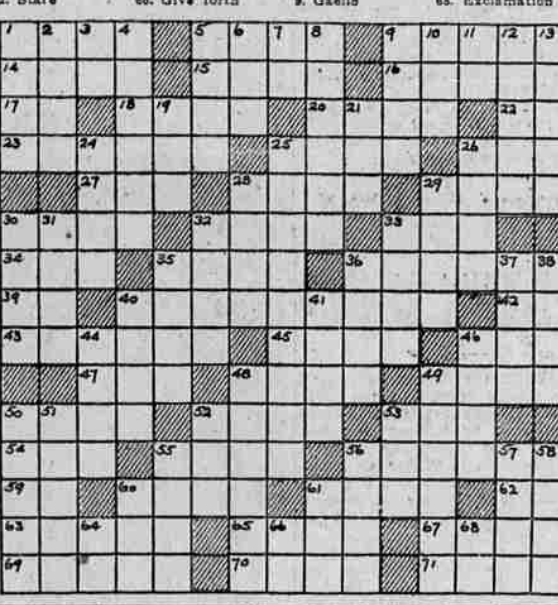

LEONARD VICTORY OVER SILVERS HAS JEERS OF CROWD

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Benny Leonard has started his comeback campaign with a knockout victory over Pal Silvers of Brooklyn, with the jeers of a crowd of 15,000 as the principal accompaniment.

Leonard floored Silvers in the second round of their 10-round bout in the Queensboro stadium last night, and Silvers stayed down for the full count, although most experts at the ringside thought the blows were anything but hard. At the count of 10, Silvers bounced to his feet, apparently unhurt, and ready to continue. Referee Arthur Donovan waved him to his corner and lifted Leonard's hand as the winner.

Benny, a bit plump around the waistline, showed the effects of his seven-year layoff from the ring. The undefeated lightweight champion appeared "stage struck" in the first round and the sudden ending of the bout in the second round made it impossible to deduce just what chance Leonard has of winning the middleweight title, the goal on which he says his eyes are fixed. Leonard weighed 153 pounds; Silvers 157.
