

ERIE PRESIDENT WILL PLAY HOST LOCAL FRUITMEN

P. H. Denny, president of the Erie railroad, will be host at a luncheon to the packers and distributors of the valley on Friday, October 16. It was announced at a meeting of the Rogue River Traffic association this noon. Denny is now on a tour of the Pacific northwest, visiting fruit centers, and is scheduled to arrive here next Thursday evening in his private car.

The state and federal government are now preparing plans and specifications for the laboratory and dwelling and stands to be erected at the Southern Oregon Federal Experimental orchard. The matter will be financed through the executive committee of the chamber of commerce and fruit organizations.

Preliminary steps by the Winter Pear advertising committee have been taken and good progress is being made, according to David Rosenberg, chairman of the Pacific Pear Council. Advance matter on winter pears is being broadcast through the press and dealers' activities.

Few of the winter pear varieties have been sold as yet in eastern markets, save for a few cases of Bosc, some for as high as \$3.00 per box.

INVITE PUBLIC TO VIEW NEW SCHOOL

With short exercises followed by an open house, Medford's new \$210,000 high school will be dedicated tomorrow evening. The public is invited to make a tour of the building and a program has been prepared.

The high school covers about one and one-fourth acres of ground space with 28 class rooms, auditorium, two gymnasiums, science laboratories, study hall, library and other rooms. The building occupies a beautiful site of about 19 acres on South Oakdale street.

Although school opened in the building the first of the month, tomorrow night will see the first formal opening of the doors to the public.

NEW YORK, Oct. 8. (AP)—A rising tide of buying orders rolled upward on the security markets today coincident with news that bankers forming the \$500,000,000 discount company expected the huge project to be incorporated within 48 hours.

Active stocks soared 30 to 40 or more. Bonds, especially railroad loans, moved upward with an alacrity which was most encouraging to Wall Street. Trading in shares was quiet until early afternoon when the upward

trend was accelerated by a heavy increase in volume and the day's prices were made toward the close.

\$1 PER 5000 GALS TO JACKSONVILLE

The published statement that the city of Jacksonville is paying one dollar per thousand gallons for the Medford water it is hauling from the main at the end of West Main street, to furnish an emergency supply for the neighboring town, until its own reservoir is replenished by rain was erroneous, according to City Water Superintendent Robert H. Duff.

Instead, the sum Jacksonville is paying is 20 cents per thousand gallons, which would foot up to \$1 for 5000 gallons.

It was stated by Mr. Duff this noon that, although Jacksonville city employees are hauling the water away at the rate of 1200 gallons an hour, and may continue to do so as long as the emergency exists—probably until after the first rain—the Medford supply is so huge that the water being taken to the former county seat town is in no way curtailing the abundant supply here.
