

DAIRYMEN AGREE TO TRY AGAIN ON MILK ORDINANCE

The Jackson County Dairymen's association meeting last night was a largely attended and with dairymen present from Grants Pass and Appleton in Josephine county, and from all parts of Jackson county.

The most important matter discussed was action of the Medford city council of last Tuesday night in refusing to adopt the amendment to the city milk ordinance which would prevent the sale of C and G grades of milk.

There was a full discussion on this action, the portion of which was that the association feels that the dairymen need protection as well as the general public, and that the amendment they had asked for was justified.

The discussion also showed that the association was not through yet, and that another effort will be made by the association to influence the city council to adopt this amendment. At the next council meeting a delegation from the association will present further arguments to have the desired teeth put into the ordinance.

A matter also came up at last night's meeting, and received with much satisfaction was the reports that the local dairymen are getting attractive bids from outside buyers, including San Francisco and other coast points, for cream. In fact Gus Prevost of Crescent City, manager of the Del Norte Products company, with plants at Crescent City and Smith River, in California, and which is an adjunct of the Golden Gate Creamery company of San Francisco, was present at the meeting and made offers. However, the matter of outside offers was only taken under consideration at the meeting. The next meeting of the association will be held one month from last night.
