## SAMS VALLEY HOME DESTROYED BY FIRE; LOSS PLACED \$3500

Fire of unknown origin totally destroyed the two-story frame dwelling of six rooms of Mr. and Mrs. John W. Jones, located in Sams Valley, 1 1/2 miles west of the valley postoffice, about 7 o'clock last evening during their absence from home. The nearest neighbor lived one-fourth mile away.

There was no insurance, as Mr. Jones permitted the policy he had carried, to lapse about a year ago. The loss on the house is about \$3000, and that on the furniture, clothing, etc., about \$500.

The seven children of Mr. and Mrs. Jones announced today that they would immediately start on the construction of a new house on the same property for their parents—who own the ground, and that this would be a much smaller dwelling of about three rooms, which could be added onto later from time to time in the future.

Mr. and Mrs. Jones were at the home of a distant neighbor where Mr. Jones was milking the cows, at the time the fire broke out, and the first they learned of the fire was when the news was brought them that the house was burned down.

They spent last night and today at the home of their daughter, Mrs. Uriah Coleman, on North Orange street, where they will remain until they get straightened out.

All of their clothing was lost except what they were wearing, as well as a big supply of canned fruit and jam, and the winter's supply of vegetables. All that was saved from the fire was the garage and their automobile. The chicken house also was not destroyed.
