

KINGSLEY WRITES CHEERY MISSIVES TO FRIENDS HERE

James E. Kingsley, doomed to walk to the gallows at the state prison at Salem for the slaying of Sam O. Prescott, Ashland policeman last January, two weeks from today, has written letters to acquaintances in this city the past week. Among those receiving epistles were his counsel, Attorney Herbert K. Hanna and O. W. (Duke) Dunford, jailer.

The letters, written on a prison typewriter, have a cheerful note, wherein the condemned man reiterates his faith in the hereafter. The missives thank the receivers for kindness extended. Kingsley is allowed the use of a typewriter, and denied the use of a pen, as a precaution against attempting to cheat the law by cutting an artery in wrist or neck.

Kingsley still entertains hope that clemency will be extended. No petition asking intervention has yet been filed with the governor.

Black-bordered invitations from the prison warden to the execution will be mailed the coming week. Warden James Lewis has extended verbal invitations to several local people. The law requires 12 witnesses, two from the county in which the crime was committed. The sheriff and district attorney have, as yet not designated anybody for the grim mission.

SELL MANY BOOKS JUNIOR EXCHANGE

Second hand books sold at the two book exchanges in the Junior high school, one for grade pupils and the other for the Junior high pupils, during the month of September, totaled \$491.99, according to a report made today by Miss Winifred Andrews, librarian.

In the Junior high department, sales totaled \$304.35, of which \$281.15 has been returned to the students. In the grade exchange, second hand books amounting to \$187.64 were sold, with \$138.44 of that amount having been returned.

The number of books exchanged in the grade department is not as large as the other exchanges, due to the new free text book law, which provides a number of books to the students free of charge.

FIRST PLANE IN HISTORY LANDS ON FACE CRATER LAKE

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK, Ore., Oct. 8.—Braving the dangers of high altitude and precipitous cliffs of the crater walls, the first airplane in history landed on the wind blown waters of Crater Lake this afternoon.

The ship, a yellow winged amphibian with crimson fuselage, was piloted by Clayton L. Scott of Seattle, accompanied by George Dahlberg, mechanic Seattle.

The feat of landing a plane on the lake had heretofore been considered foolhardy and it was thought that if once landed, the ship would be unable to gain sufficient altitude to climb from the confines of the surrounding walls, averaging 1000 feet in height and reaching nearly 2000 at some points.

The ship approached the lake from the Anna Springs checking station and was flying fairly low when it reached the brink of the rim. With little hesitancy, the big amphibian circled gracefully around Wizard Island and landed easily near the shores of the island, despite heavy waves lashed into whitecaps by a strong mountain wind.

Soon after it landed, the ship taxied toward the east shore, and slowly raised from the water and gradually gained altitude until it was high above the rim. The amphibian circled low over the information building while Pilot Scott tossed out pictures of the ship and identification of its passengers. The ship barely missed tree tops but soon pointed its nose skyward and disappeared over the eastern horizon.

Scott and Dahlberg landed at the Medford airport yesterday afternoon to refuel, previous to departing for Crater Lake at 8:30. Airport officials considered the feat impossible, and did not believe the fliers would succeed.

The fliers did not return to Medford following their landing at Crater Lake, but continued north, it was learned today.
