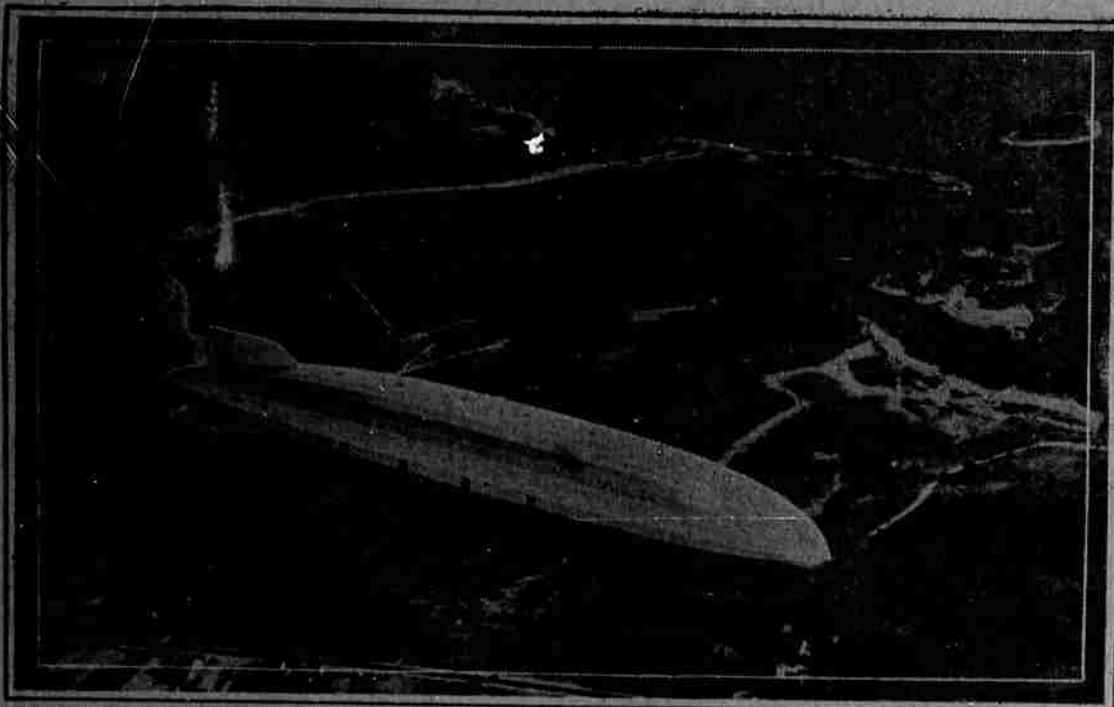
QUAINT SCENES IN FAR OFF LANDS lend enchantment to the stay-at-home, and here are glimpses in Rumania, England, Italy and Morocco. A typical market scene in Sibiu, Rumania, is shown upper left. Peasant women from the surrounding countryside are arranging their wares for inspection. Upper right, a shepherd and his dog are seen with a flock of sheep descending from the grazing pastures on the Downs between Lewes and Ditchling, in England. These are South-down sheep of the kind recently exhibited by the Southdown Sheep Society at Chichester. The days when knights were bold returned recently to Bari, Italy, when various episodes of the Contest of Barletta of 1503 were re-enacted, as shown lower left. The event was called the second "Fiera Del Levante" and thousands of people attended. One of the strangest of all things is the city of Casablanca, Morocco, seen lower right. Any girl found without means of support is placed in this walled town and kept there until a man, wanting a wife, buys her out.



JIMMIE WALKER is the name of this new sunburst dahlia held by Barbara Maurel, concert and radio artist, at the 17th annual Fall Flower Show at New York. This was the first time the Jimmie Walker dahlia had been shown.

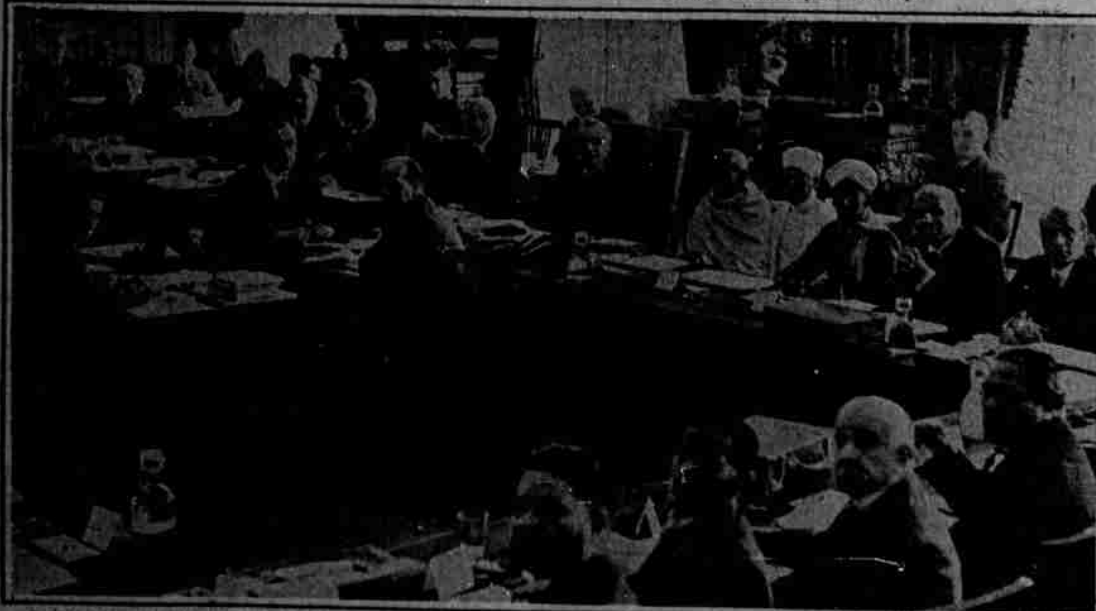
SLENDER AND SILVERY GRACE—THE U. S. S. AKRON thrilled the nation when it soared into the skies on its maiden flight. Here is the great airship at the edge of Wingfoot Lake, near Akron, O., its home port. Photographers swarmed about the new air queen, and this picture was taken from a special plane chartered for the purpose. The Akron carried 113 persons on its first flight, including Charles Francis Adams, secretary of the navy; David S. Ingalls, assistant secretary of the navy for aeronautics; and Lieutenant-Commander Charles E. Rosendahl, captain of the ship.



GRAPE QUEEN is the title which might be given Miss New York Concord, who is supervising picking of the luscious fruit in the Chautauqua and Erie grape belt, in the Finger Lakes country of the Hudson valley. The crop is glorious, and so is she.

Next, left to Gandhi is Lord Sankey, lord chancellor, who acted as chairman of the meeting; then Lord Reading, foreign secretary and former viceroy of India; Lord Peel, and Sir Samuel Hoare, secretary for India.
