MEDFORD AERIAL ATTACK DEFEATS EUREKA 19 TO 6

Scheel And Shreve On Receiving End Of Walker's Heaves—Both Teams Batter Line Effectively—Coast Team Scores First.

EUREKA, Oct. 10.—(Special)—With their pass attack functioning for the first time this year, the Medford High Tigers held Eureka at bay on the ground today and won 19-6. Medford completed six out of eleven passes for a total of 127 yards with Bill Walker heaving to Scheel and Schriever for long gains.

Eureka started out with a bang, scoring her touchdown in first three minutes, gaining 65 yards on two plays, the first play being a 37-yard dash by Bill Walker heaving to Scheel and Schriever for long gains.

Scheel reeled off huge gains thru tackle, gaining 47 yards on two plays, but hurt his foot in the second quarter and Walker replaced him. The "mite" filled the air with tosses that bewildered Eureka's backs. He ran 20 yards in the second quarter to the one-yard line where Fichtner went over again.

In the second half Medford scored when Walker passed 35 yards to Scheel who made a spectacular catch and fell over the goal line.

Eureka's offense tore holes in Medford's line, but fumbles hurt their chances. Medford made 14 first downs to 19 for Eureka. Eureka completed two passes for 12 yards.

It was an offensive game for both teams. Neither being able to stop the other's line smashes, Scheel, Walker and Fichtner were Medford's backfield stars. While Cunningham and White made Eureka's big tackle look bad, Captain Paulino and Ball were Eureka's biggest ground gainers.

be tacklers off at the start and then rolled over the chalk mark as Ray Finn, substitute center, made an attempt to knock him down.

The other three periods saw both teams working into scoring territory several times but intercepted passes stopped most of the charges.

Washington outgained the Web-footers both on the ground and in the air, advancing the ball for a total of 278 yards compared with 153 for Oregon. Both eleven made nine first downs, the Huskies gaining five from scrimmage, three from passes and one from a penalty, while Oregon got six from scrimmage, two from passes and one from a penalty.

The northern advanced the ball in 46 scrimmage plays, a total of 122 yards, Oregon moving it forward 111 yards in 53 tries.

In 21 attempted passes, Washington completed five for a total of 146 yards and had five intercepted. Oregon tried 12 heaves, completing three for 42 yards and losing the ball three times on interceptions.

In the punting department, Oregon outkicked the Huskies, averaging approximately 41 yards on their boots to Washington's 34.

LA GRANDE, Ore., Oct. 10.—(AP)—The Cheney Normal school, led by Peterson, a plunging, ground-gaining fullback, defeated the Eastern Oregon normal school, 19 to 7, in a football game here today.

Cheney dominated the first half, which ended 7 to 0, but in the last half the mountaineers rallied and pushed across their only touchdown.

The final Cheney touchdown came as the result of an intercepted eastern Oregon pass near the goal line.

MOHLER STARS AS TROJANS TRAMPLE COUGARS HANDILY

OLYMPIC STADIUM, LOS ANGELES, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Orville Mohler, playing the part of a football Pepper Martin, led the University of Southern California to a smashing victory over Washington State 38 to 6 today. He scored four of his team's six touchdowns, one after a brilliant 55-yard run.

The victory evened an account of a year's slaying between the Trojans and the Cougars. Washington State defeated Southern California 7 to 6 last season, marring the Pacific coast conference records of the men of Troy.

The black-thatched Mohler took no part in the early proceedings, not entering the game until the beginning of the second period but once in he was hard to get out.

The Trojans had been pulled up short in the shadow of the goal line in the first period when the visitors took the ball on downs on the three-yard line. It was different when Mohler took a hand.

His first play was a lateral pass to Shaver, good for a gain of 37 yards to the Washington State 25-yard line, and then Mohler carried the ball in successive plays to the 20-yard line, the eight-yard line and then across the goal line.

For the second counter, Mohler ran 25 yards without an opposition finger being placed upon him.

Sparring contributed the third touchdown with a 50-yard run on a reverse play.

Mohler's outstanding dash was made after Pinckert took a Washington State kickoff, following the Cougars' only score, a touchdown by Myron Davis after a 18-yard dash, back to the 35-yard line. Mohler then slipped through the middle of the line with a masterly exhibition of side stepping eluded all the visitors and crossed the line standing up.

The last Mohler conducted score was early in the fourth period. The fleet back lugged a pass 24 yards to the 14-yard line and after that carried it within eight yards to a score. Shaver bucked it within inches of the goal and Mohler ran over.

The final score was negotiated by Willard Brouse, third string quarterback, assisted considerably in his goalward march by Dick Barber.

Washington State was outclassed but not outthought for the Cougars were "in there trying" at the final gun. One of the bright spots of the game was the punting of George Bander, who gave one of the best kicking exhibitions of years in the Olympic stadium. The Cougars also offered a fine brand of hard, clean tackling.

The Trojans gave Captain Turk Edwards, giant Washington State tackle a wide berth most of the afternoon and the defensive honors for the visitors fell to Walter Camp, the other tackle, a player with a great football name.

IDAHO NOSES OUT MONTANA 21-19

MOSCOW, Idaho, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Idaho's Vandals tore through Montana's line for three periods today, but the Grizzlies lightened the fourth to hold Idaho to a 21 to 19 victory in their coast conference football game.

Unleashing a powerful line attack at the start Idaho demoralized the Montana defense and scored in the first period. Wilson, flashy quarter, going over and converting the try for point.

Montana lost a chance to score in that period when Calvin crossed the goal line but was tackled so hard he dropped the ball. Wilson recovered for Idaho.

STANFORD TRICKS IN LAST QUARTER ROUT MINNESOTA

Misjudged Punt By Somers Opens Way For Victory—Gophers Wage Bitter Fight—California Upsets Dope.

STANFORD STADIUM, PALO ALTO, Cal., Oct. 10.—(AP)—Ripping Minnesota's defense with a fourth period offensive, Stanford's Indians scored a 13-0 victory today over the mid-western team in a fiercely fought interscholastic battle.

Behind reverses, fake reverses and laterals the Indians turned a potentially scoreless game into a riot.

Long passes, smashes off tackle behind perfectly timed interference and good old-fashioned line bucks broke down the vaunted defense of the Maroon and Gold garbed eleven.

For nearly three periods, the warriors from the northwest withstood scoring threats. Then Stanford saw and seized its chance.

Somers, whose brilliant play at quarterback for Minnesota had thrilled 30,000 spectators there and again, miscalculated a punt. Hand, Stanford substitute, left tackle, dropped on it, 21 yards from Minnesota's scoring turf.

Allen flipped a pass to Caddell that was good for 17 yards. Hillman, quarterback, plunged into the center of the line and came up with a one-yard gain. Caddell went over the remaining three yards for a touchdown. Moffatt made the try for point with a place-kick. The touchdown came on the first play of the fourth quarter.

Cheering had hardly died down before the men of Stanford were on their way to another score. The Indians received the kick off on their 22-yard line. When the ball was released by them, another touchdown had been posted.

Statistics tell a convincing story of Stanford superiority. The far west warriors gained a total of 282 yards from scrimmage to 73 yards for the visitors. Minnesota made two first downs in the first quarter and no more thereafter. Stanford took up the first down quest and finished with a total of 17.

BERKELEY, Cal., Oct. 10.—(AP)—An aerial attack that failed to click until the last 10 minutes of play, carried the University of California to a surprising 6 to 0 victory over the San Francisco Olympic club eleven here this afternoon.

The lone touchdown of the game was scored on a pass from Watkins to Castro, California fullback, who ran 10 yards to score. Watkins buried the ball from the club's own 25-yard line. Carlson's place-kick failed.

GONZAGA RIPS UP MONTANA STATE

SPOKANE, Oct. 10.—(AP)—The Gonzaga Bulldogs ripped through the Montana State Bobcats in awesome style tonight, using forward passes and terrific line bucks to win, 38 to 0, in a benefit game for the Shrine crippled children's hospital here.

Terrific line smashes by big Max Krause, fullback and lightning passes by Bill Frazier, quarter, added by a line that cleared holes wide enough for a regiment to march through, spelled the Bobcats' doom.

TACOMA, Wn., Oct. 10.—(AP)—Ellensburg Normal gridders staged a last quarter rally to defeat the Pacific Lutheran gladiators 13 to 0 here in a night game.

The first score came in the middle of the quarter when the invaders began a sustained drive from midfield, Exley going over from the two-yard line. Ellensburg counted again on a long pass, Sutphin to Paulson.

NOTRE DAME HELD TO SCORELESS TIE BY NORTHWESTERN

SOLDIER FIELD, Chicago, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Rain, mud and a great Northwestern team conspired to stop Notre Dame's famous victory march of football at 30 straight conquests before an excited throng of 75,000 spectators at Soldier Field today.

The "fighting Irish," carrying on for their departed Knute Rockne, weren't beaten in their valiant bid to establish a new winning streak but were held to a scoreless tie, a result which was almost as precious to the white shirted giants from Northwestern.

Of the two teams, evenly matched in all departments, but stopped by the almost constant deluge which churned the battlefield into a veritable quagmire, it was Northwestern which came the closest to victory. Twice the Wildcats marched on the break of fumbles, to within the shadows of the Notre Dame goal line only to be turned back. Once, the Wildcats hammered through to the Notre Dame four yard line only to miss their first down by the heart breaking margin of one foot. A few minutes later, in the same second period, they rushed to the five yard stripe only to see their golden opportunity float away on an incomplete pass over the goal line.

The Northwestern 20-yard line was the limit of the Notre Dame football travels today. Three times, the "Fighting Irish" got to that point but they could budge the Wildcat line no farther.

Statistics gave Notre Dame a slight edge in the game despite the two big Wildcat threats that were almost cashed in. The raiders from South Bend made 106 yards from scrimmage to 61 by their rivals and piled up six first downs to Northwestern's three. Fumbling was about even but Northwestern recovered nine muffs to six by the Irish. Not a single pass was completed and only one was intercepted and that one by Notre Dame deep in its own territory.

SEMON FAVORITE IN PAT HANDICAP, BEATS WOOD 3-2

With his defeat of Dave Wood in the quarter finals 3 and 2 Russ Seamon is being doped to win the P A T golf handicap at the Medford club this year, although there will be several hard scrums to contest his walking away with the cup for the second time.

In the other rounds the quarter finals have not been reached but probably will be played off over the week-end. Gain Robinson who defeated R. S. Headley 4 and 3 will meet Ted Miles who trimmed R. W. Ruhl 5 and 4. Charles Strang, who is determined to shoot his age and defeat Jack Porter 2 and 1 will next week meet W. Gardner. M. Spatz is another comer who romped over Frank Doremus 7 and 6 and will next tangle with Ray Moran, who nosed out C. J. Seamon two up.

L. P. Wilcox promises to be in near the finish, after a hard fought victory over C. M. Kidd 2 and 1. Ted Baker is one of the dark horses, springing a big surprise when he ran away from the former champion of South Gold Hill. Sprague Riegel, 4 and 4. Bill Vawter is another white hope, having practiced hard of late, nosing out Wheldon Biddle on the play off 1 up and will meet Harry Rosenberg as soon as the latter gets his picking done.

There were two other big up sets the past week when Fred Weeks vanquished the master stylist Slater Johnson, 3 and 2, and Deek Buckingham, the hardest man to beat in the club, nosed out the former champion, Earl Tumpy, 2 and 1.

In the ladies' handicap tournament, Mrs. R. B. Smith defeated Mrs. Ray Moran, one up. Mrs. Althea Vawter defeated Mrs. O. O. Alender, 3 and 1, and Mrs. E. Janouch finally nosed out Mrs. Sprague Riegel after a neck-and-neck struggle by one hole.

ROTHSTEIN AIDE ADMITS 'FIXING'

MINNOLA, N. Y., Oct. 10.—(AP)—Jimmie Meehan, former gambling house partner of Arnold Rothstein who was held for a time in connection with the gambler chief's murder, was arrested today for conspiracy in the wholesale "fixing" of races.

Meehan, who was a player in the high spade game in which Rothstein lost \$300,000 shortly before he was slain, was arrested as a result of the confession of two negroes, Drummond Jackson and James Hartwell, who said Meehan paid them to tamper with horses.

Jackson gave himself up and confessed after an attempt was made last Monday to break into the Belmont stable of Victor Emanuel, young millionaire sportsman who races his horses both here and abroad. He implicated Hartwell and the latter gave Meehan's name.

Hartwell listed a number of race horses he had helped to slow down by drugs or nose sponges.

Meehan said he was first associated with Rothstein in 1921 as pay off man and later ran a gambling house in Westchester county for him, receiving one-fourth of the profits, which amounted to about half a million dollars.

DIAMOND HONORS AND \$4,844 EACH WON BY ST. LOUIS

SPORTSMAN'S PARK, ST. LOUIS, Oct. 10.—(AP)—In a finish that alternated thrills and chills for the home forces, the Cardinals recaptured the banner of the world baseball championship today, bringing it back to the national league and St. Louis after a lapse of five lean years.

The National league champions, in a spirited attack, conquered their nemesis, none other than George Earnshaw and whipped the Athletics, 4 to 2, in the seventh and deciding game of the prolonged battle. It gave the Cardinals the decision, four games to three, duplicating their margin of triumph over the Yankees in 1926.

Old Burleigh Grimes, the 37-year-old master of the spitball, was the hero of the final victory. He scored his second triumph of the series over the Mackmen, to avenge his 1930 setback, but weakened in the ninth and was relieved by southpaw Bill Hallahan. The southpaw, who twice had whipped the Athletics, to the rescue with two out, the tying run on first base, ended the game by forcing Max Bishop to fly out to Pepper Martin.

It was an exciting finish, as the A's put on a belated drive with two out, due mainly to the wildness of Grimes, whose strength was fast ebbing and who appeared to feel the strain of hurrying with a battered little finger, hurt by a line drive in last Monday's game.

It was a fitting climax to a battle for baseball honors that surged back and forth in dramatic fashion before the Cardinals finally broke down the rule of the Athletics; ended the American league's streak of world series triumphs at four straight; blasted Connie Mack's dream of a record string of three conquests; brought the games highest honors to their grizzled pilot, Charles (Gabby) Street at the close of his second big league managerial year, and clinched the winners' share amounting to \$4,484 per man.

Right Fielder George Watkins' home run drive off Earnshaw, turned out to be worth just about \$45,000, representing the aggregate difference between the winners' and losers' share of the financial spoils. It had looked earlier in the game as if it turned out it was the decisive stroke in furnishing the margin of victory.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Oct. 10.—(AP) Purchase of 1200 acres of land on the Klamath river was announced here yesterday by the California-Oregon Power company. This land will be used as a power plant site if the company eventually receives permission to start its proposed program which will involve expenditure of about \$29,000,000 over a long period of years.
