HEAD TELLS NEED OF MUSIC BRANCH

Elaborating on the outlines that have been presented during the past few days relative to the Civic Music association branch, which is being formed in Medford, Wm. F. Isaacs, president for southern Oregon, explained its operation today.

"It is apparently the only feasible method of insuring the city an opportunity of hearing real concert programs without any financial risk. The Civic Music association has one great objective—to give to a city or a community musical programs that will appeal to all classes," he said.

If you are a member you have a right to attend all programs in your city or in any other city that

has an association branch, Mr. Isaacs pointed out, and if you are not a member you can't receive tickets before or on the date of the concert. No city has less than three concerts, and it may have as many as the membership will warrant. A minimum membership of 400 is required for formation of the branch.
