

EGGS ARE STRONG ON FEW RECEIPTS; PRICE UNCHANGED

PORTLAND, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Egg market trade is strong in practically every leading center of the country, the Journal says today. No change is generally shown locally for the day, but practically all private interests are now following the full price of the co-ops. There is some talk and even quotations by private interests of higher prices than being listed by the co-ops, but so far as known this is talk and nothing more. Egg receipts are barely holding their own in the home territory or along the coast generally.

There remains a very good tone in the market for butter here and along the coast generally. There was no change in the price list. No seasons of exchanges were held Monday.

Despite the weakness reported by a government news agency, there appears continued steadiness in the market for live chickens here, with 15c being freely offered for heavy hens and 11 1/2c for light offerings.

First hothouse tomatoes of the season have been received here. The supply consisted of odds and ends from a Portland plant and sold at a dime a pound. First shipment from Eugene arrived Tuesday and sold at \$2.75 crate for extra fancy.

DEMAND IN GOTHAM FOR OREGON TURKEY

PORTLAND, Oct. 12.—(AP)—An urgent call from New York for fresh dressed Oregon turkeys, gave central Oregon producers a price 4 cents a pound higher than the opening value of a year ago.

The Frawley-Clark company of Portland, made this statement. As buyer of a liberal supply in the Redmond district at 30c lb for No. 1 toms and 28c for No. 1 hens. These prices are 4c above that paid at the start a year ago.

The call was an emergency one and Oregon was picked by the New York buyers as having the best turkeys in the country.

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Share prices slipped backward rather rapidly today, although trading in the stock market was the quietest in a fortnight. There were numerous losses of 2 to 3 points at the finish. Sales totaled only about a million and a half shares.

The widespread belief that the market should be given a chance to consolidate its position after last week's sweeping advance checked buying. Profit taking sales found the market without a fusion of support from repurchases by shorts, since bears had been severely restricted. On the whole, brokers said, the market's reaction was about as expected.

They seek \$250 damages, and ask that the work be stopped, alleging it will effect the value of the property.

JURY LIST DRAWN FOR COURT TERM OPENING OCT. 26

The rule, in full, is: "Any school, whose students, supporters, rooters or partisans take part in riots, fights, pilfering, painting or any unsportsmanlike conduct against any other school in the association, shall forfeit all games played and won, and shall be automatically suspended for an indefinite period from the association."
