

### MEDFORD POSTAL CARRIERS ATTEND KLAMATH MEET

The carriers of the Medford post-office had a goodly delegation in attendance at the second meeting of the letter carriers of District No. 4, which comprises Klamath Falls, Ashland, Grants Pass and Medford, held at Klamath Falls last Sunday, and would have been larger had City Superintendent of Mail H. Houston decided not to go, after learning that nothing would be buried in the river to keep it cold.

The first meeting was held in Ashland last May at which time the temporary organization work was perfected and machinery set in motion for a permanent organization. The object of these meetings is to unite more closely in a fraternal way the carriers of the district, to create a deeper interest in state and national postal organizations; to work for the constant improvement of the postal service, and to become more intimately acquainted with each other. The next meeting will be held some time next June, date and place to be set later.

All the postoffices were fairly well represented at Sunday's meeting, notwithstanding that the hunting season had put in a loud call for some of the mail men.

After partaking of a bountiful basket dinner, prepared by the ladies, a short business session was held.

The meeting was called to order by the district manager, R. C. Fager of Klamath Falls. Short talks by some of the visitors were much enjoyed, the first of which was from the postmaster of Klamath Falls, Mr. McCall, who spoke of his high regard for postal associations and their work and his sincere co-operation with them; also of the faithful, hard and honest work the postal men owed to the public.

The national state vice-president, Frank P. Fuge, of Oregon City, was next to give a talk along the lines of association work and service to the public. His remarks were to the point and were much enjoyed.

### REALTY BOARD IN SALES TAX PLEA TO HELP FAMILY

The following resolution favoring a sales tax was adopted by the Medford Realty board and forwarded to the National Association of Real Estate Boards in Chicago:

Whereas the executive committee of the finance division of the National Association of Real Estate Boards in its meeting in Chicago on August 30th, 1931, recommended as follows:

"The devising of some plan to afford tax relief for the single family dwelling occupied by its owner."

The Medford Realty Board recognizing the great stabilizing influence of home ownership, both in the city and in the country, believes that now as never before such ownership must be encouraged, and that the amount of money a family spends determines the ability of that family to pay taxes and not the mere fact of the ownership of a home. Therefore, be it resolved that the Medford Realty Board recommend:

First, that all homes in the city and farm units in the country used and occupied by the owner be exempt from taxation to the extent of the assessed value of \$1500.

Second, that a general sales tax of two per cent, or such amount as is found necessary, be levied by the state on all commodities sold by retail stores and tickets sold by places of amusement, money so raised to be used to replace taxes now levied on homes.

Resolved, that a copy of these resolutions be sent to the National Association of Real Estate Boards, to the president, succeeding Dr. Leonard W. Riley, resigned.
