

GAME SUPERVISOR GRANTED INCREASE FOR OFFICE WORK

Kelly's Salary Unchanged—Budget Same As Last Year—Pollution of Willamette Under Discussion

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 14.—(AP)—Meeting in routine session here yesterday afternoon the state game commission approved a budget of \$395,888 for the year and fixed the salary of the new game supervisor, H. L. Kelly, at \$4,200, the same as that of his predecessor. Another \$1,000, however, was made available for office expenses for the head of the department.

The commission's budget, made this year for the first time, calls for \$395,888 for the next twelve months. Last year's expenditures were about the same.

Budget Drawn
Among the items in the budget were the following: To state police fund for warden service \$127,058; stream surveys \$80,000; hatchery expenses \$140,000; educational \$10,000; engineering \$14,000; game farms \$45,000; office expenses \$18,000 and sundries \$16,760.

Pollution of the Willamette river at Oregon City was discussed. Investigators said they believe 90 per cent of the pollution is caused by the industrial plants there, and 10 per cent by the municipalities of Oregon City and West Lynn. Oil, sawdust and sulphide waste from the paper mills was mentioned as the greatest factor.

ROAD WAR CAUSE IN ASHLAND AREA ERASED BY COURT

Steps towards settlement of the road war raging in the area south of Ashland were taken this morning when the county court looked up the records and learned therefrom that the contested right-of-way was a county road and had been one for more than a score of years. The county ordered that an "S" be changed to an "F" in the original route as petitioned to be changed back by an amended order, so directing.

Mrs. Harry Ewing, one of the alleged combatants in an altercation last week, was released from the Sacred Heart hospital late yesterday. It was alleged that in the heat of battle cement blocks were hurled, as well as fists and angry words. A watchdog, it was said, also participated in the fracas. The Floyd Blumhardt, charged with being the other side of the argument, and the Ewings are scheduled to tell their account of the "war" to Justice L. A. Roberts, in Ashland, this week.

The dispute originated over whether the route was a county road or a private road. Upholders of the latter theory stretched wire across the road and the other faction cut it down. Then the bitterness is alleged to have started.

BUDGET DRAFTERS MEET WEDNESDAY

The first meeting of the budget committee has been called for next Wednesday, October 21. The committee, with the county court, is composed of B. E. Harder, Medford, banker, E. T. Newberry, Phoenix, farmer-fruitgrower and W. H. McNair, Ashland, druggist.

Estimates of all county offices and departments for the coming year have been assembled and the budget committee is expected to be busy with them for the next six weeks. It is expected that "economy" will be the objective, as long as it is not painfully detrimental to conservative progress.

A public hearing on the budget, as provided by law, will be called for the first week in December, and the budget is supposed to be in the hands of the county assessor for extension on the tax rolls by January 1.

BAND WILL PLAY FOR SCOUT FETE

The high school band, under direction of Wilson Watt, has been secured to give a concert at the Boy Scout jamboree at the Armory Friday evening of this week. The band will play continuously from 7:30 until 8:00 p. m. and will fill in with one or two numbers during the program.

The scout displaying the best craftsmanship in his exhibit will be given an individual award, which is being presented by the American Legion post of Ashland.

Special arrangements have been made for a loud speaker system so that everyone in the Armory will be able to hear what is going on.

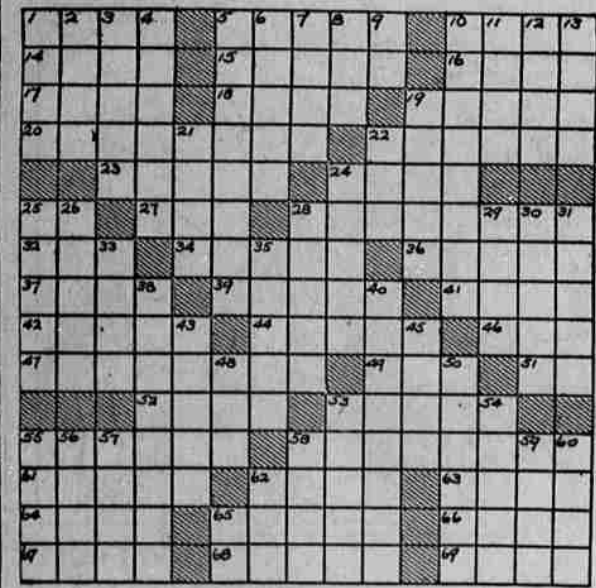

CYCLE, OVERCOAT THEFTS CHARGED

A case of non-support, one of petty larceny and another of larceny by bailee were aired in Judge Taylor's court yesterday afternoon and today, in addition to several lawsuits.

Harry Roberts and James, local young men, were arraigned on the charge of petty larceny, they being accused of stealing an overcoat valued at \$20 from Everett Carlin. Both pleaded not guilty and their trials were set for October 19. Each was released on \$250 bail.

J. V. Nygren, local man, charged with larceny by bailee, was ar-

raigned and his examination was set for October 17. He is alleged to have left the county and state with a motorcycle valued at \$100, which he had been buying on the installment plan, without permission of the owner, O. A. Thatcher.

The charge of non-support against Fred C. Stimson, preferred by his wife, Lydia, who claimed he did not support her and their two children, was continued three months for examination, on condition that he support his family in the meantime. This decision was reached by Judge Taylor after he had some testimony from both sides, which was very conflicting.

CALL FOR BIDS ON NEW COURT HOUSE TO BE OUT SOON

The county court has prepared a "notice for calling for bids," for construction of the new \$265,000 Jackson county courthouse. The notice provides that bids for the work will be received up to November 2, next.

The call for bids was drafted yesterday and is now in course of legal approval, before publication, as required by law. The first publication will be next Friday.

The call is the stereotyped form, setting forth the requirements, where plans and specifications can be received and that an approved bond must be filed by the successful bidder for performance of the contract. The county reserves the right to reject any or all bids.

It will probably be ten days or two weeks after the closing date for bids, before the awards will be made, as all will be considered by the county court and the citizens advisory building committee. Besides bids for general construction, bids will be sought for electrical work, plumbing and painting. It is estimated that it will be close to December 1, before actual construction is started.

The county court yesterday afternoon conferred with a representative of the United States Steel corporation relative to the structural steel to be used.

PACIFIC BUILDERS HEAR LOCAL PLAN

Medford's condensed form of zoning laws, which have proved thorough and comprehensive, were considered with much favor at the Pacific Coast Building Officials' conference last week in Berkeley, according to F. H. Rogers, city building inspector, who attended.

The many California cities where numerous systems have been worked out, did not prove as thoro as the Medford plan, the delegates stated. The planning commission, appointed by the mayor, was another point that had not been considered previously by delegates to the conference, who were interested in the work of the group.

Mr. Rogers reported that the group was fairly amazed when they heard that Jacob L. Crane, Jr., of Chicago, prominent planning engineer, had visited Medford and outlined plans for a civic center.

MEDFORD GUARD UNITS RECRUITED UP TO CAPACITY

The affairs of Medford's two National Guard units, company A and the Headquarters company are in exceptionally good condition for this time of year with both recruited up to full strength of three officers and 60 men for Co. A, and two officers and 17 men for the Headquarters company.

This state of affairs for Company A is very unusual for this period, and presages some fine military development of the unit this fall and winter through its weekly drills and study. Both units are now creating a waiting list and in the case of Company A, with a little weeding out of men who show a lack of interest by not attending drill regularly the company within two weeks is expected to be drilling with a 100 per cent attendance.

The last three men to be recruited in Company A were Glen W. Thomas and Walter S. Gilmore, both of R. F. D., Medford, and Fred Schaefer, also of this city, who were taken in at last night's drill.

The fact that the enlisted men of the National Guard are paid for attendance at drills greatly aids in keeping the ranks full. The pay for privates ranges from \$1 to \$2.40 per attendance at the weekly drill.

INSTITUTE PROGRAM TO FEATURE CLASS PIANO

A demonstration of class piano work will be featured at the Jackson county teachers' institute to be held Monday, it was announced today.
