ELEPHANT EATING OREGON FAIR OUT OF HOUSE, HOME

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 15.—(AP)—Legal action to clear the way for removal or disposal of Tusko, large elephant left at the state fair grounds after the fair was instituted today by Max Gehlhar, director of the fair upon whose office the duty of providing food for the animal has fallen.

Attorney-General I. H. Van Winkle today was preparing papers for placing a lien on the animal. The lien will cover feed bills, wages due the attendant and other expenses incurred since the fair closed Oct. 4.

The elephant is owned by T. H. Estlick of Portland, who had informed the fair officials he would return for the beast in a few days. After several notices, Gehlhar said the elephant was still on his hands.

Tusko at one time was owned by the Al G. Barnes circus. Two years ago the elephant went on a rampage near Sedro Woolley, Wash., with the result that claims were filed against the circus in the amount of \$30,000.

Tusko is chained to his trailer and at the present time is costing more than \$50 a week for his care.

WEAVE NET ABOUT MURDER SUSPECT

LA GRANDE, Ore., Oct. 15.—(AP)—An accumulation of circumstantial evidence, advanced by the state in seeking to convict Willard Sullivan of first degree murder, was further augmented today as the trial went into its third day.

Sullivan is charged with slaying Homer Bidwell, prominent Union rancher, near North Powder last June.

As court opened today the defense attorney began cross-examining Gordon Derrick, state's star witness, who testified yesterday that he met Sullivan on the day of the crime near the Bidwell ranch.

Sullivan, he declared, told him that Bidwell was dead. The state is attempting to prove that this statement was made before Bidwell's body had been found.

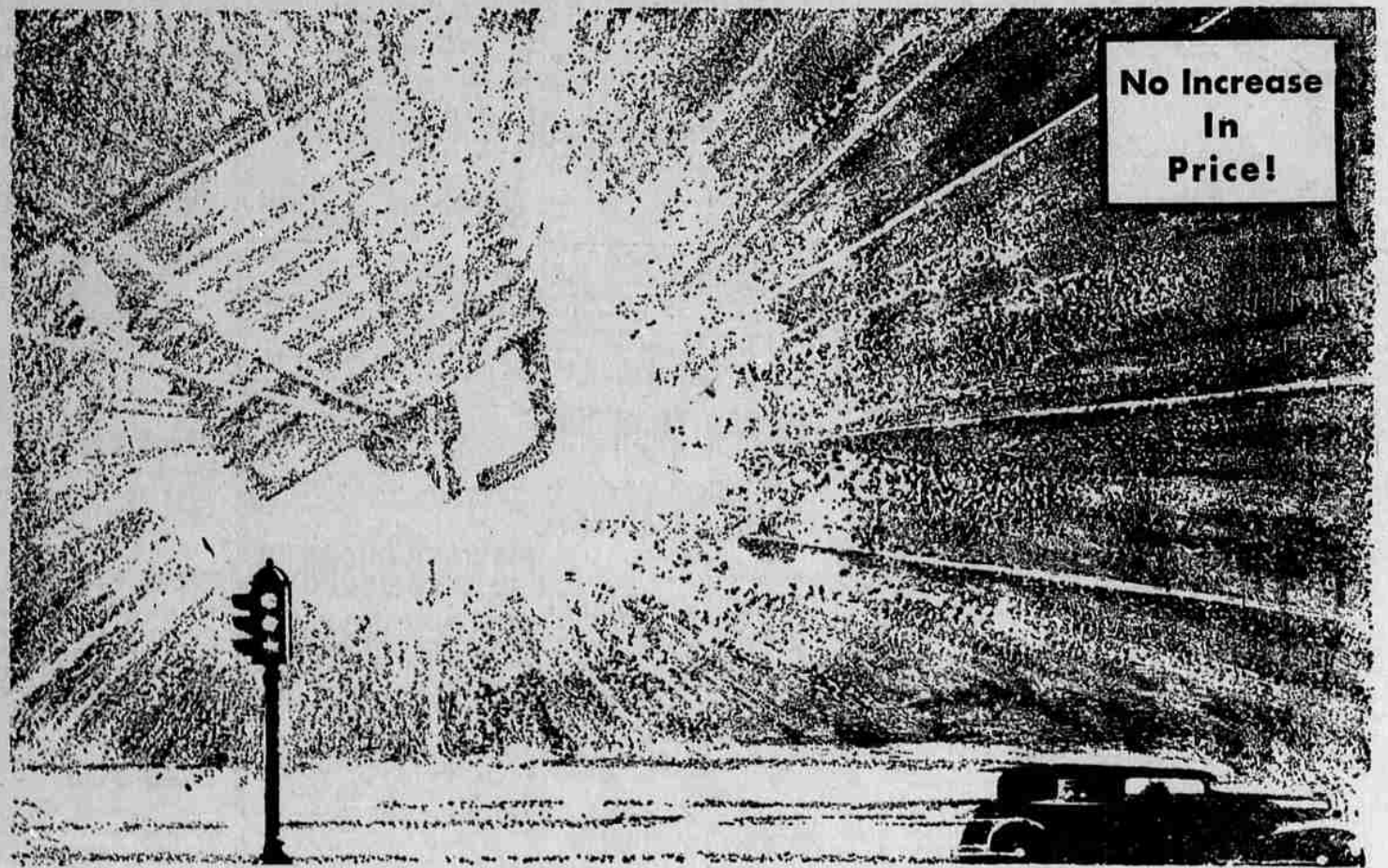
