

Fast Boys Will Swap Hooks and Jabs in Elks Club Ring Tonight

FOUR HOT BOUTS CARDED BY OWEN FOR LODGE ARENA

Bobby Ambrose And Young
Doc Snell Meet In Main
Event—Semi-Final Will
Pit Morgan And O'Neill.

Everything is all set for the boxing events of tonight at the Elks Temple, to which each Elks is privileged to invite two friends, and every indication is that the exhibition of twenty rounds in four events will be one of the best ever put on by the lodge.

The participants in the main events arrived yesterday at the morning in excellent condition and Herb Owen, the well known Eugene matchmaker, arrived this afternoon enthusiastic over the exceptional card he has arranged.

The full will start immediately after a short session of the Elks lodge. The Elks band will be on hand with stirring airs, but there will be no need in the basement of the temple following the card, as has been a feature of Elks smokers in past years, for the main reason that Pete Bigham, the chief of such events wants to see the fighting himself for once, and to keep the edge of food from distracting any attention of the fans from the efforts of the boxers.

Heavy Card Scheduled

There will be a six round main event, a six round semi-final and two preliminary events of four rounds each. The semi-final will attract almost as much attention as the main event, for which the classic preliminaries will whet up the pugilistic appetite.

Bobby Ambrose, of Salem, 12, and Young Doc Snell, 125, of Albany will be the competing milt artists in the main event, whose reputation for cleverness and hard hitting prefaces six rounds of that up on the low excitement, so characteristic of the bouts each has participated in in Oregon and Washington cities. The fast action and willingness of these men to exchange punishment in hopes of winning is expected to have the crowd in a frenzy.

Fully as much action and excitement is anticipated in the semi-final because of the reputation of Ray Morgan, 147, of Portland and Jerry O'Neill, same weight, of Salem, earned in fast goes. They are willing boxers, each of whom carries a bad wallop, which indicates a knockout imminent all the time.

Classy Preliminaries

Herb Owen was particularly fortunate in lining up two such classy preliminaries. Buddy Ambrose of Salem and Louie Nelson of Portland, 135 pounders, will open the show, and following this bout will come the event between those two sterling 135 pounders, Curley Johnson of Albany and Ray Avery of Eugene.

While no curb has been placed on the Elks and their friends in giving way to ordinary excited enthusiasm during tonight's card, the lodge officers request that no one jump out a window during temporary delirium, and that the fans refrain from alighting chairs up to the ceiling and from clapping one another on the back so hard as to knock false teeth out.

**Night Grid Games
Boon To Colleges
With Heavy Gate**

KANSAS CITY.—(AP)—Night football, an expensive three years ago, has done for smaller colleges in the southwest what floodlights have done for the lesser leagues in professional baseball.

With the novelty worn off, night games are more numerous—except on Saturdays—than daytime contests between small colleges in this section.

Out of 141 games scheduled for Friday or Saturday, more than 80 are to be decided after dark. On the other hand, only 14 of 106 Saturday games are scheduled for night-time, the reason being that most customers have Saturday afternoons off.

**Rockne Trophy For
Champion Gridders**

CHICAGO, Oct. 15.—(AP)—The new trophy to be awarded to the 1931 national championship football team, of the basis of the Dickinson rating system, will be known as the Knute K. Rockne memorial.

The first edition of the award was won permanently last year by Notre Dame, the first institution to win it three times over a period of two years. Its donor, Jack P. Hyslop, has offered another one under the same conditions.

CHARITY FOOTBALL TO FURNISH GREAT FEAST FOR FANS

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—(AP)—A quick response to Owen D. Young's call for football to help the unemployed has brought prospects of the greatest gridiron carnival in the first two weeks of December that the United States ever has been.

After the chairman of President Hoover's committee on the mobilization of relief resources issued his request for football's aid, games today were arranged involving ten of the best outstanding football schools, the Western conference had laid the groundwork for more battles and various other colleges and even professional teams had fallen in line.

The Army-Navy game at New York, December 12, originally the one big charity clash, now takes place as the climax of a great football festival involving Yale, Dartmouth, Holy Cross and Brown on the one hand and Princeton, Pennsylvania, Cornell and Columbia taking place during the week preceding the service clash.

The two tournaments, which bring a new idea into eastern football, were announced through E. K. Hall, chairman of the intercollegiate football rules committee.

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HUGHES MAY GET CHANCE TO PLAY AGAINST TROJANS

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 15.—(AP)—A squad of 33 University of Oregon football players, accompanied by Dr. Clarence W. Spears, head coach, was headed for southern California today for next Saturday's tussle with U. S. C.

A tentative change in lineup was announced by Spears just before train time. He said it was possible neither Irv Schulz or Red Wilson would be able to play. Bernie Hughes and Howard Clark will get the call, he said, if the regular guards are unable to participate.

A workout at Oakland was scheduled for today. The next stop will be in Los Angeles.

SPORT SLANTS

The big turn-overs this year have not been confined to Wall Street or Main street by any means.

Nineteen thirty-one has turned up the biggest crop of new sports champions any campaign has known in a long time. It was an inevitable process with long time rulers such as Bobby Jones and Big Bill Tilden stepping off their thrones, but the rest of the field has caught the spirit, and made it a gala year for the new generation of titlists.

The spectacular victory of Helen Hicks, 30-year-old New York girl, over the five times winner of the national women's golf championship, Gianna Collet Vase, climaxed the establishing of a complete new list of golfing champions in England and America.

Tommy Armour, the new British open champion, and Francis Ouimet, American amateur king after a 17-year interval, are no strangers to the heights, but the others are all new to the rare altitudes — Billy Burke, American open; Tom Creasy, Professional Golfers' association; Eric Martin Smith, British amateur; Euid Wilson, British women's.

Eleventh Vines, 19-year-old Southern California sophomore, smashed his way to the national tennis championship and will be difficult to dislodge for some years to come. Sidney Wood, Jr., added a youthful name to the list of Wimbledon tennis victors.

Helen Wills Moody alone among the tennis royalty of the past several years resisted all challenges to her supremacy.

On the international side, Santa Paula's "four horsemen" from the Argentine galloped to victory in the American open polo tournament for the first time. Max Schmeling of Germany clinched his claim to the heavyweight fighting crown by a knockout triumph over Bill Stribling of Georgia.

A few colleges have taken steps to prevent their head coaches from capitalizing their reputations off the field, via the newspapers, magazines or radio, but most of them have either acquiesced or found themselves powerless to prevent such exploitation.

SEATTLE MERMAID ESTABLISHES NEW RECORDS IN TANK

SEATTLE, Oct. 15.—(AP) An orgy of record breaking by Helene Madison, champion woman swimmer, gave her a new world's mark for the mile swim and seven new American marks in 1 exhibition before "home town" fans last night.

Swimming against time in a 25-yard pool, the "Short Course," she covered the mile in the new world's record time of 23 minutes 37 1-5 seconds. She broke her own world's mark of 24 minutes 34 3-5 seconds, and lowered the American mark held by Miss Ethel McGary, New York, of 25 minutes, 56 seconds.

The other six American marks she upset were at various distances in the mile, all of which were held by Miss McGary. She swam without any opposition.

COLLINSVILLE, Ill., Oct. 15.—(AP) Mad Play, famous race horse of other years, will run in no more cheap plater races, at least at Fairmount park.

Winner of approximately \$106,000 in purses while racing under the colors of Harry P. Sinclair's Banterra stable, old Mad Play, under new owners, was entered Saturday in the last race on the program, with victory worth only \$450 to the winner. Twelve horses went to the post.

Mad Play could get no farther to the front than fourth, and he passed the judges' stand with six horses ahead of him. As he passed the stand he went lame.

The stewards knew Mad Play deserved pleasant pasture, but they couldn't arbitrarily order the horse to pasture. They could, and did, however, rule that the entry clerk reject entry of Mad Play for future races.

It was reported at the track today that the present owners plan to turn Mad Play out to pasture.
