

SHRINERS' TRAIN STARTS FOR RENO ON FRIDAY NIGHT

One week from today the special train of southern Oregon Shriners will leave Klamath Falls for Reno, Nev., to participate in a joint ceremonial with Kerak temple. Potentate Carl Y. Tengwald and his divan, the Hillah patrol, band and drum corps will make the trip. They will be accompanied by scores of distinguished Shriners and their wives.

The pilgrimage will be supervised by two past-potentates, E. C. "Jerry" Jerome will head the committees for Hillah, while Fred Lippman, past-potentate of Kerak temple, will head the ceremonial plans in Reno. Jerome predicts that Hillah's special train will carry 200 wearers of the Red Fez.

The train will leave the Southern Pacific depot at 9 o'clock Friday evening for Reno, arriving in the gala city about 7 o'clock Saturday morning.

The parade will start at 1 o'clock Saturday afternoon. It will be characterized by the colors worn by the Hillah patrol and uniformed bodies after the parade the Shriners will continue to the University of Nevada-Fresno State football game. Last year Fresno State defeated Nevada with a score of 4 to 0. The defeated team has been preparing for months to get revenge and the clash Saturday, October 24, promises to be a real one.

Hillah's wrecking crew, directed by Dale Turrett, will confer the second section on a large class of Nevada and Oregon novices during the evening ceremonial. Banquets, motor trips to Virginia City, Carson City and Lake Tahoe are also included in the extensive program promised.

A special round-trip rate of \$10 from Klamath Falls to Reno has been granted Hillah temple by the Southern Pacific. Pullman rates will include occupancy while the Shriners are in Reno. Reservations here are being received by Nobles, A. S. Rosenbaum and Leon B. Haskins.

4 ELECTROCUTED, ONE IS SAVED FOR MENTALITY PROBE

CHICAGO, Oct. 16.—(AP)—Four murderers were electrocuted in the electric chair at the county jail shortly after midnight today.

A fifth was saved from death at the last minute by issuance of a stay based on an insanity petition.

Those executed were: Frank Jordan, alias Carlson, 30, convicted of slaying Policemen Anthony Ruthy and Mounted Policeman Patrick Durkin.

Charles Rocco, 34, and John Pope, 21, sentenced for the fatal stabbing of Courtney Merrill, south side banker, during a robbery.

Richard Sullivan, alias Davis, 35, who shot Christ Patras, restaurant proprietor.

Frank Bell, condemned to die for the same crime for which Sullivan was electrocuted, was granted a stay of execution thirty minutes before the time set for him to march into the death chamber.

Warden David Montgomery had sought clemency in Bell's behalf because he had helped to thwart a jail break in which a prisoner had planned to shoot his way to freedom with a smuggled pistol.

MILLION AND HALF LETTERS BY PLANE

A million and a half air letters were carried between Pacific coast cities by mail-passenger planes of United Air Lines, it was reported today by traffic officials of the Seattle-Medford-San Diego subsidiary. During the past thirty-day period, the company planes transported 37,422 pounds of air mail.

Tri-motored passenger-mail transports on the daylight services carried seventeen and one-half per cent of the total, while the balance was flown on the overnight mail-passenger schedules.
