

LAVAL EMBARKS FOR CONFERENCE WITH MR. HOOVER

Daughter and Two Companions Accompany French Premier — Hearty Welcome Assured On Arrival.

HAYRE, France, Oct. 16.—(AP)—Premier Laval, accompanied by a staff of financial experts, sailed aboard the liner Ile de France this

afternoon for the United States where he will discuss important world problems with President Hoover.

His 18-year-old daughter, Josephine, and her two companions, the Misses Jacqueline Guimier and Renee Claudel, are making the trip with him. Ambassador Walter E. Edge escorted the premier aboard the liner and assured him that the United States would give him a hearty welcome. The ambassador rode down on the train with him from Paris but will not make the trip. Robert Pell, Mr. Edge's private secretary, is accompanying the premier as his liaison officer with the American press. His other fellow passengers included financial experts and staff aides.

Crowd Bids Farewell
A great crowd was on hand to wish him farewell when he left Paris. All of his cabinet ministers, except M. Briand, were at the station as well as Andre Francois-Poncet, French ambassador to Berlin. He declined to make a statement.

Pressed for an explanation as sailing time drew near he replied cautiously "I am convinced I am working for Franco-American collaboration. I am aiming at world peace."

It was known from his radio address last night, however, that he hoped to consider in his talks with President Hoover problems related to international economic conditions but that he did not expect to achieve any material results.

"The duty which I am undertaking with a view of closer cooperation between the United States and France gives rise to new hopes," he said then, "but let us beware of illusions."

"In our days in Washington we shall not settle the affairs of the universe. We shall make known to each other our ideas. I shall tell President Hoover what I think of my country, its hope and what I can do."

Friday the major portion of the program will be devoted to table decorations. Table service, house furnishings and color suggestions will be presented. Meats, fish and fowl will be prepared for the illustration period.

The closing day of the school she will present Halloween suggestions and games. Holiday dinners will be discussed from the standpoint of health and festivity. Turkey dressing will be prepared, a luncheon table and Thanksgiving and Christmas tables arranged.

A feature of the school, which will prove especially interesting to local cooks, is the pear pie competition. The woman who bakes the best pear pie for the school will be well repaid in prizes.

A Hostess model Hotpoint range will be displayed on the stage throughout the school. Classes will close each day at 4:30 o'clock.

Ben Hickman, the colored bootblack with a stand outside a West Main street establishment for the last year, and whose home on West Eleventh street was raided by the authorities last Wednesday night while a card party was on inside, at which a quantity of liquor was found, was given a suspended sentence in Taylor's court this forenoon of 6 months in jail, on the charge of possession.

The sentence was suspended on condition that Hickman leave the city with his wife and children inside of five days, and remain away from Medford. No fine was imposed for the reason that the little money possessed by Hickman was needed for the support of his family and also needed to enable them to leave within the prescribed time.

The authorities were well satisfied, as they considered Hickman an undesirable citizen.

COUNTY TEACHERS INSTITUTE SLATED MONDAY MORNING

The school people of the county will rise early next Monday, County Superintendent Carter declares, for institute registration opens at 8:15, and some have fifty and more miles to drive.

The morning program begins at 8:45, with Medford high school chorus giving the opening music numbers for this first institute in the new building. After a brief business session of the teacher body, E. F. Carleton will address them on "Background and Perspective."

Following the gathering of teachers into sections from 9:45 to 10:15, Dr. Francis D. Curtis, University of Michigan, will give an auditorium address on "Some Criteria of a Good Class Period." Section groups will then meet until noon, when luncheon will be served in the building by ladies of the Junior High P. T. A. in room six. The School Master's club also holds noon luncheon and business session in the building, room five.

Opportunity to view the entire building will be given from 12:45 to 1:10. Principal Smith says, when the Medford high school teachers will be "at home" in their own rooms.

Afternoon session opens at 1:15 with the Glee club of Roosevelt school, and Dr. B. C. Wilson following with brief outline of health club work.

At 1:30 Dr. Curtis will give an address in the auditorium entitled "Looking Ourselves in the Eye."

After a half hour of section meetings, the last auditorium number of the day will be given by Anthony Euwer, poet and artist of Portland, when he gives a reading "Let's Go a-Rhyming." Mr. Euwer will bring with him to Medford some twenty or more of his mounted water colors which will be displayed in the building.

The day will close with the business session of county division O. T. A. when committee reports, plans for the year, election of delegates to state convention, nomination of an O. S. T. A. president, and election of the county officers, all comprise important business for the county educators.
