

VALLEY VILLAGES VOICE COMPLAINT AGAINST SPEEDERS

State Police Will Enforce Observance of Slow Signs - Stops For Highway Entry Also To Be Eyed.

The state police today cautioned motorists against speeding through small towns of the valley, inasmuch as complaints have been received from residents of speeders ignoring slow signs and intersections.

Gold Hill, Central Point, Rogue River, Talent and Phoenix, through which the Pacific highway runs are the main points, but rural intersections with arterial highways will also be watched.

The tragic death of C. B. Ward, a week ago while crossing the Pacific highway in the business section of Phoenix, inspired the present action.

The state police also this morning received complaints that bird hunters were shooting at random in back yards and barn yards, and it was announced that a close check up would be made.

Yesterday the highway patrol of the state police checked up on hunters for loaded guns in autos, and proper license plates, and found a low percentage of violations.

THOMPSON NAMES LEADERS OF DRIVE FOR CHEST QUOTA

Campaign Opens November 3—Rally Breakfast Planned For Workers—Optimistic Reports Received.

Complete plans for the Community Chest drive to open here November 3 were announced this morning by J. C. Thompson, chairman, with the list of committee heads to carry on the campaign.

The drive will be formally opened with a breakfast at the Hotel Medford the morning of the third, from which the workers will continue to their various assignments. The goal, approximately a duplicate of last year's, is \$21,035.

The speakers' bureau will be headed by Rev. C. B. Porter, major donations by J. C. Thompson and C. M. Kist; outside organizations by W. S. Bolger and A. P. Johnson, employees by Larry Schade and D. G. Tyree, C. Baker, secretary of the chamber of commerce, will handle publicity for the drive.

Divide Campaign Work

The city campaign will be divided into four parts. Solicitations, to be made by prospect cards this year, will be carried on by the service clubs and the Medford Post, American Legion. They will be headed by the following men: Kivwanis, J. C. Mann; Rotary, Dr. E. W. Shockley; Lions,

G. W. Newberry, and Legion, Wilson Wait.

John Niedermeyer of the Active club will head the drive in the suburban districts and M. Maruyama in the Japanese colony.

Encouraging reports regarding drives in other cities have been received from the chamber of commerce. Quotas are being attained with little difficulty as people realize the necessity for organized relief work as a means of protecting themselves as well as the needy.

Other Cities Cited

Five cities completing early campaigns report the following results: Duluth Minn., population 101,463, raised \$313,000, an over-subscription of \$10,000 and \$28,000 in excess of last year. Elgin, Ill., population 35,000, goal \$71,395, raised to date \$81,000, exceeding any previous year's total of this chest by \$30,000. Green Bay, Wis., population 37,000, goal \$41,400, raised \$69,000. Last year's quota was \$32,626. Wichita Falls, Tex., population 43,000, goal \$59,915; raised in four day campaign \$61,000. Seattle, Wash., goal \$790,000, raised \$806,000.
