BUSINESS WOMEN TELL PLANS FOR POSTER CONTEST

For the second successive year the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's clubs is announcing a poster contest, open to its clubs in nearly 1300 communities, to secure an official poster symbolizing the progress of business and professional women.

State contests will be held in 47 states and the District of Columbia and the prize-winning poster in each state will be sent to New York to be judged in a national competition which closes November 15.

Announcement to this effect was made today by Miss Ada D. Albert, of Portland, State Publicity Chairman of the Oregon Federation of Business and Professional Women's clubs. The prize offered in the state contest is \$10, while \$50 is the national award.

SOLINSKY MOVES HEADQUARTERS OF PARK INTO TOWN

Superintendent E. C. Solinsky and the headquarters office staff with all the office records and equipment moved today to Medford early yesterday afternoon to the Crater National Park's suite of offices in the federal building, for the winter.

The weather has been fine at the national park, in the valley and the work at the park could have been continued for some time yet, at least until snow and inclement weather interfered, but the park construction work for this year was practically completed, and the fact that stormy weather is liable to come any time now influenced the removal of the headquarters to Medford.

About 10 carpenters, masons, rangers, culinary workers, laborers and the like were still at work yesterday, but the majority of the men engaged on construction work and some of the others were expected to cease work for the year by tonight or within the next few days, leaving but a handful of rangers, and permanent foremen to look after the cleanup work and see that everything is in shipshape order to withstand winter's rigors.

Superintendent Solinsky is well satisfied with the construction and other improvement work accomplished this year, and says that all was accomplished in this line that he had expected—in fact more, owing to the early summer start and the fine autumn weather that has been prevailing still more could have been done had Washington allowed more money for it.

Quite a number of tourists and others continue to visit Crater Lake daily and will continue to do so as long as the weather permits.

However, the new rim road construction work is still under way under direction of the bureau of public roads. The contractor of the first unit of the road still has about 80 men at work and will continue the work until Nov. 1st, weather permitting, and the contractors who have the second and third units of the new road have also small crews at work.
