

OREGON TO FACE TROY MEN UNDER HEAVY HAVNDICAP

Loss of Lillard, Hot Sun and Weight of Opponents Reduces Dr. Spears' Hope for U. of O. Victory

(Associated Press Sports Writer) LOS ANGELES, Oct. 17.—(AP)—Confronted by increasing obstacles, Oregon's undefeated football team, the surprise eleven of the Pacific coast conference, set out to test the University of Southern California Trojans' famous power today. But there will be no collision between the "Midnight Express," otherwise known as "Smoky" Joe Lillard, negro halfback for the invaders, and the Trojan war horse, for Lillard yesterday was declared ineligible by faculty representatives of the conference.

Besides the loss of his star halfback, an expert passer, Coach Clarence Spears' team faced the prospect of playing S. C. under a hot sun, a decided handicap for the webfeet of the northwest.

Oregon Outweighed. Another point against Oregon was the fact that the mighty men of Troy, whose chief offensive asset has always been power, will outweigh their opponents by a goodly margin, especially through the center of the line, where the power plays strike.

In the face of these impending conditions, Dr. Spears was none too optimistic. As a matter of fact, he was outspoken in his belief that with Lillard absent, the Webfeet entertained small hope of keeping their record untarnished.

On the other hand, he worked his squad twice yesterday: in the cool of morning and again in the evening, indicating the possibility that Lillard or no Lillard, Dr. Spears might still be up to his old gridiron tricks. Coach Howard Jones' team was expected to be in top shape.

Martin temple will play half, instead of Lillard for the Webfeet. The contest will be the first between the two institutions in eleven years.

Columbia University of Portland was on the shut out end of the score.

More than 6000 persons watched "Spec" Keen's three football teams go into action against the Irish lads in the first night game played here. At the end of the first quarter the first string men had piled up 30 points.

16-TEAM TOURNEY FOR BASKETBALL TALKED IN STATE

Athletic Association Discusses Plan to Solve Redistricting High Schools—Final Action Tonight

SALEM, Oct. 17.—(AP)—Proposals for a 16-team basketball tournament for Oregon were discussed at the

meeting held here yesterday of the State High School Athletic Association in an endeavor to solve the question of redistricting the high schools of the state. Final action on suggestions made is expected tonight when the association reconvenes in Portland.

Two plans were suggested whereby an equalized representation of the high schools of the state might be assured in the annual tournament in March. One was to divide the present 10 districts which are represented by 12 teams, into 16 districts with one team from each district, and with no division as to A and B teams. The other plan provides for the representation of smaller schools in a tournament of their own, to be held at the same time as the state tournament for larger schools. This plan calls for eight B and eight A teams.

Other discussion centered around the scheduling of a three-day tournament instead of the usual four and around the arrangements suggested for the clearance of the old trouble over the drawing of byes. All districts were represented at the meeting.

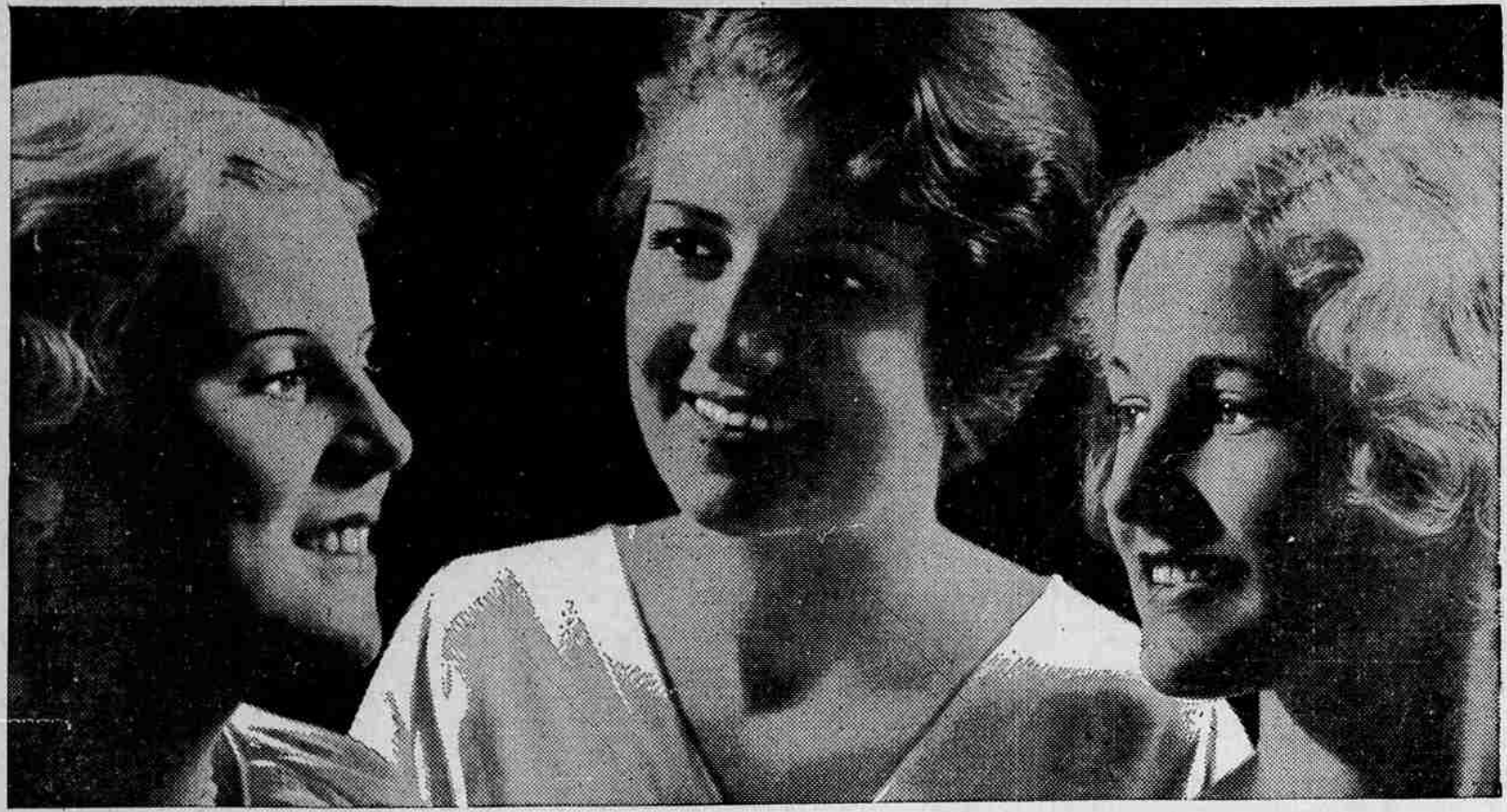
