Willett Pupils in Recital on Monday

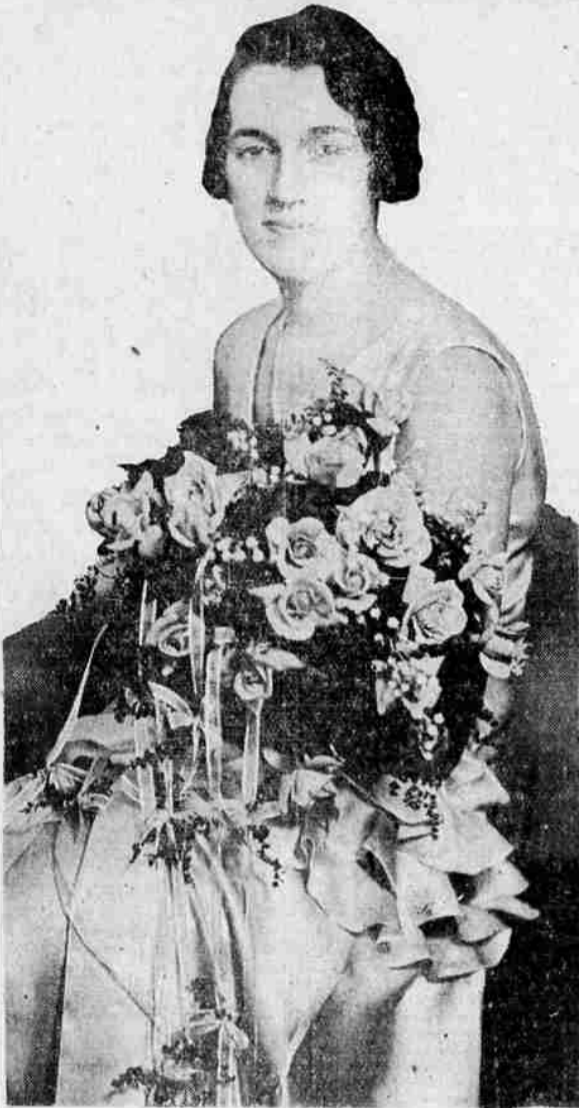
