

### MCCASKEY AGREES AFTER JAIL TERM TO SCHOOL RULES

Martin McCaskey, of Wards creek near Gold Hill, completed his ten days sentence yesterday for failure to send his two minor children to school, and was released after he had promised in the presence of witnesses, that he would have his flock in school Tuesday. County Judge Alex Sparrow, admonished and lectured McCaskey.

According to reports reaching county authorities, the children were in Rogue River this week, with their mother. It was claimed that they were needed to tend to the stock, while their father was in jail. Investigation showed they had one cow.

It is also alleged that the children and their parents, objected to walking half a mile or so, to the school bus line.

McCaskey promised to send his children to school when first arrested and was allowed to go, after a ten days sentence had been imposed. He failed, and was apprehended by state police, hiding in the brush near his home. Because of his elusiveness, McCaskey, a man of 55 years, was called "the Jackrabbit of Ward's Creek," by officials.

### MOTHER TO CELL, BIDS SON ADIEU

Mrs. Ann Wright, mother of two boys, under sentence of two years in state prison, for her part in the plot of her husband and Ivan Robbins, to defraud by arson, bid them a tearful good bye, in the women's ward of the county jail. With her husband, under a ten-year sentence, and Ivan Robbins, under a five-year sentence, and Mrs. Mary Robbins, under a two-year sentence, she will be taken to the state penitentiary tomorrow. The quartet confessed to setting fire to a dwelling in the Duckshot Hill district last September.

In passing sentence, Circuit Judge J. T. Brand of Marshfield, remarked that through custom and precedent had been established, leniency was not to be expected by women because of their sex, and that in the eyes of the law, no discrimination was made. The husbands in pleas to the court, exonerated their mates.

### CITY DADS BUSY WITH NEW BUDGET

The Medford city officials and the official citizen advisors of the latter will soon be busily engaged in preparing the budget of operating expenses next year.

Already the various city departments are preparing their tentative budgets to be submitted at a joint meeting of the city council the last of this month with the city budget committee. The latter committee of well known business men, which has been in touch with city affairs, at least theoretically, as it was appointed for that purpose by Mayor E. M. Wilson, when he took office, will meet Monday night to talk over budget affairs and will also hold two other meetings this week for the same purpose.

### COMMUNITY CHEST ASKS COUNTY FOR EMERGENCY FUND

The following motion, carrying the unanimous vote of all the directors present at the regular meeting of the board of directors of the Medford Community Chest, Inc., was submitted to the county court, city council, and city and county budget committees.

"The Medford Community Chest, recognizing that there is to be a need for relief work during the coming winter, pledges itself to do everything possible to raise the necessary funds by private subscription, but it is the belief of this organization that it is incumbent upon the state, county, and city to create emergency funds adequate to take care of the situation which cannot be handled by private agencies.

It is the recommendation of the Medford Community Chest that the first item in the county budget for the calendar year 1932 be an emergency fund to be used for the purpose of supplying relief employment, if necessary; and it is further recommended to the county court of Jackson county, that in the creation of a budget for the coming year, various other items be reduced sufficiently to provide for such an emergency fund, without causing an increase in the present tax rate.

"We have been informed that the county budget committee is receptive to the idea of the creation of an emergency fund, and it is suggested that if such a fund is recommended by the budget committee, that the county court approve such recommendation."

### PATCH SUIT FOR DAMAGES CALLED, OFFICIALS SCORE

The damage suit of Roy G. Patch, against the Pacific Theaters, Inc. (Holly) for \$50,000 damages for alleged negligence, relative to the operation of a moving picture projection machine, is scheduled to start before Circuit Judge J. T. Brand of Marshfield in circuit court tomorrow.

Patch alleges that his eye-sight was impaired through the alleged negligence. M. O. Wilkins of Ashland, attorney for Patch, filed an affidavit of prejudice against Circuit Judge Norton, who is occupying the Coos county bench.

In the damage suit of Mrs. Nettie Marcho of the Applegate district for \$18,000 damages against Dr. B. C. Wilson, county physician, and O. W. (Ike) Dunford, county jailer, a jury after short deliberation, returned a verdict denying damages on all three counts. Mrs. Marcho, a county medical ward, and invalid for many years, alleged false imprisonment and mistreatment as the basis of the suit. The defense was represented by Attorney George A. Coddling, and the plaintiff by Attorney M. O. Wilkins.

R. E. Sweeney acted as foreman of the jury. The verdict was signed by ten of the jurors, Mrs. Cordelia G. Root and Carl Goetsche, both of this city, declining.
