LOCAL FOLK PLAN TO HEAR ARTISTS

Team captains were given final instructions Monday night at a dinner held at the Hotel Medford, when all officers, board of directors, captains and assistants were present. All memberships, entitling holders to admission to a course of artists' concerts, to be offered here this season, may be secured at the nominal fee of \$5.00 for adults and \$2.50 for students. OREGON HAS GOOD HEALTH STANDING, SAYS DR. WARNER

Dr. Estella Ford Warner, first speaker on yesterday afternoon's program of the Health Workers' Institute in session at the Y. W. C. A. building in this city, related for the southern Oregon workers the experiences of her trip through several states in the interests of a health survey. Dr. Warner, now with the United States Public Health Service, has been sent over the nation to observe conditions and progress in health work. yesterday afternoon's program. She devoted her message to the work of the supply chairman and discussed the finances of the organization. 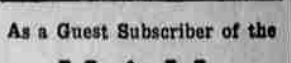
