## TIMER ON RANGE PREPARES MEAL DURING ABSENCE

The Telechron Timer has now taken over the job of getting the daily meals in homes where the electric range is one of the servants.

The "Hostess"—a modern new automatic electric range, which its makers (GE) announce as their "advanced 1932 model," is equipped (at slight extra cost) with a smart-looking Telechron clock, enclosed in a modernistic case of black bakelite.

This electric clock goes far beyond what might be expected of an electric kitchen clock. Madame does not have to be at home to watch the clock to see when to put the dinner in the oven.

This clock doesn't have to be watched.

Connected with the switch mechanism as well as the electric line from which it gets its impulses, the timer permits Mrs. Housewife to be gone all day, if she elects and to come home to find her dinner completely prepared—piping hot—and ready to serve.

Minute instructions for preparing complete oven meals are contained in an interestingly written book which accompanies the electric range.

Mrs. Housewife selects the particular oven menu she desires—prepares everything in the cool of the morning—places it all in the oven and sets the timer to turn the current "on" at a given time and "off" at the time desired; sets the temperature control at the specified temperature and leaves the house with complete assurance that all will be well when she gets home.

## Wesson Oil For Fine Fruit Cake

1 cup Wesson Oil, 1 cup shaved citron, 1 1/2 cups brown sugar, 3 cups flour, 4 eggs, 2 teaspoons salt, 1 1/2 cups candied cherries, 1 cup chopped candied pineapple, 3 cups nuts, 1 cup fruit juice, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1 cup raisins, 1 teaspoon ground cloves, 2 teaspoons cinnamon, 2 teaspoons allspice, 1 cup chopped figs.

Mix the Wesson Oil, sugar and egg yolks and beat vigorously for two minutes. Sift together spices, salt, baking powder and two cups of the flour and add alternately with the fruit juice to the first mixture. Then add the fruit and nuts which have been mixed with the remaining cup of flour. Fold in the egg whites, beaten stiff and bake in a very slow oven (275 degrees F.) for about four hours.

## MEET TO TALK LURING TOURISTS

Business men and federal forest officials of nine counties of southern Oregon and northern California will hold a two days meeting at Bedding, Calif. next Monday and Tuesday, of the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland association organization service, with headquarters in that city, to discuss ways and means to perfect the organization of the association. Hugh B. Rankin, supervisor of Crater National forest will probably be the only Medford man to attend, as so far the Chamber of Commerce has not selected a representative.

It is contemplated by the organizers of the association to at this meeting make a survey of the vaca-

tional and recreational activities of southern Oregon and northern California, in co-operation with the federal forest service, and adopt a program of publicity in connection therewith to attract tourists.

Such publicity would be of great importance to Medford, it is pointed out, as this city is the gateway to such sightseeing and recreational centers as Crater Lake, Diamond Lake, and Lake of the Woods, and is one of the gateways to the Oregon Caves.

The Oregon counties embraced in the association are Jackson, Klamath, and Lake, and the California counties are Siskiyou, Modoc, Lassen, Tehama, Trinity and Shasta.
