

### EMPLOYMENT IN JACKSON COUNTY ABOVE AVERAGE

#### Opening of Courthouse Work and Highway Plans Bright Spots — Gram Here On Labor Survey Tour

Jackson county's employment situation is more favorable than the average in Oregon, according to C. H. Gram, state labor commissioner, here with Charles H. Erey, deputy commissioner, on a survey of employment conditions. The situation throughout the state is also viewed by Gram as more favorable than the average for the nation.

Gram estimates 20,000 to 25,000 unemployed in Multnomah county and a total of 40,000 in the state.

The local labor market will be somewhat brightened by opening work on the new court house, registration of workers for which will start Monday. Should the Pacific highway betterment program as advocated for this district be carried out, the county situation will be further strengthened.

Although Attorney J. M. Devers' report to the state highway commission places Jackson county's unemployed at 1,000, local officials believe this figure overdrawn. It is also pointed out that of this number many are seasonal workers who are only partially employed in winter months even during normal conditions.

SALEM, Oct. 23.—(AP)—Twenty thousand persons in Oregon outside of Multnomah county are now or will be jobless during the winter months, the state-wide survey of unemployment conditions made by J. M. Devers, attorney for the state highway commission, revealed. The report submitted to Governor Julius L. Meier and made public last night, estimated that Multnomah county's unemployed alone would equal that of the rest of the state, making an approximate 40,000 individuals needing work.

dependents are provided for, thus placing the needy dependent list at a total of more than 60,000 up-state and about the same number in Multnomah. The report was presented to the state highway commission to be used as a basis for allocating road work coming under the emergency relief program this season.

#### All Counties Affected

No county in the state, Devers' report stated, is without a large number of unemployed. In virtually all counties it has been estimated that the least possible amount necessary for a man to provide for himself and family is \$36 a month or \$1.50 a day. At this rate it would necessitate an expenditure of \$3,900,000 to take care of 30,000 jobless and their dependents for the five winter months, the report estimated.

Very few of the cities and towns are able to provide much in the way of employment, local unemployment committees informed Devers. While there is sufficient clothing, food and shelter to take care of everyone in the state, the problem is to make it possible for those without to secure enough for their needs. Other organizations in counties and cities are doing much in the way of charity to relieve some of the needy, Devers said.

#### Some Hard Hit

Counties in which the greatest emergency exists at the present time, the survey showed, were Deschutes, Crook and Hood River. These sections reported from 7 to 13 per cent of the total population out of work, with dependents making from 20 to 33 per cent facing the winter without funds. Others approaching this percentage included Klamath, Lake, Curry and Union counties.

Reconstruction or betterment of the Pacific highway has been recommended by Jackson county to aid in caring for its 1,000 unemployed. Last year Jackson county listed 689 unemployed.

### NEW EVIDENCE IS BROUGHT TO LIGHT IN TRUNK MURDER

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 23.—(AP)—Possessed with new evidence that they said weakened the story of Burton J. McKinnell, university law student and brother of Mrs. Winnie Judd, hunted murder suspect, police today awaited the outcome of the coroner's inquest into the slayings of Mrs. Agnes Lerol and Miss Hedvig Samuelson before requestioning McKinnell.

At least a dozen witnesses were summoned by Coroner Frank Nance to testify at the inquest into the killings of Miss Samuelson and Mrs. Lerol, both of Phoenix, Arizona, whose bodies were discovered in two trunks here. Mrs. Judd is sought in connection with the deaths.

L. J. Andrews, Phoenix county attorney, and Inspector David Davidson said they believed McKinnell had not told them all he knew of the whereabouts of Mrs. Judd, who disappeared from his automobile on a downtown street soon after they called at a railroad station for the trunks. Mrs. Judd fled after a station agent saw blood seeping from one of the trunks and questioned her.

They said they learned from Russell B. Howe, brother student of McKinnell, that a few hours after he and his sister had called at the railroad station to claim the trunks McKinnell approached Howe with a plea for money.
