JACKSON COUNTY 4-H CLUB TEAM TO JUDGE STOCK

The 4-H club contingent of Jackson county, consisting of one of the best livestock judging teams at the recent county fair here, made up of James Lathrop, Harold Smith and Fred Loflander of the Central club, piloted by county agent G. Fowler, will leave early tomorrow morning for a two days' stay at the Pacific International livestock exposition at Portland.

In addition to this feature there will be three pig exhibits of porkers weighing around 175 pounds each, sired by Harold Smith and James Ernest Lathrop, who shipped their pigs by auto truck to the exposition yesterday.

Both the stock judging team and the three individual exhibits will be the most formidable kind of competition from the over 50 4-H teams and exhibits from 11 western states, to the east as far as Nevada and Utah.

The other of the two top livestock judging teams at the exposition consisted of George McCracken, Arvey Childers and Muriel Morris of the Valley View Club club, who participated in the recent state fair at Salem, where they placed third. Each team could not attend both the state fair and exposition, so they chose to go to Salem and the other to the exposition.

The 15 pigs of the three exhibits will be sold by their owners at Portland at the close of the exposition. The 4-H stock judging will be placed next Tuesday.

NEBRASKA PASTOR COMING TO TAKE LUTHERAN PULPIT

The Fremont, (Neb.) Evening Times has the following to say regarding Rev. George P. Kabele, who will assume the pastorate of the English Lutheran church in Medford, relieving Dr. H. C. Funk who has resigned, effective December 6.

After five years as pastor of the Salem Lutheran church in Fremont, Rev. George P. Kabele has tendered his resignation to accept a call to the Lutheran church in Medford, Ore. The congregation of the local church will be called to consider and act on his resignation following the morning service on November 1, the exact date of the 5th anniversary of Mr. Kabele's call to the Fremont church. After accepting the call, he assumed charge on December 31, 1928.

In his formal resignation, the pastor stated that his health requires a change to a more equable climate without the severe winters which are experienced in this section. With Mrs. Kabele, he will leave for Medford in time to take charge the first Sunday in December.

Mr. Kabele's new charge is the only Lutheran church in Medford, a city of 12,500. The new church building was dedicated only four years ago. During his pastorate in Fremont, Mr. Kabele has increased the membership of the Salem church to 650 and has directed substantial progress along many lines. The church debt has been reduced about \$14,500. The Sunday school has practically doubled in average attendance and has been thoroughly graded and organized. A total of 328 new members have been received into the confirmed membership of the congregation, and more than half of the present membership has been received into the church by the present pastor. The communicant membership at the end of the last synodical year has increased almost two and a half times what it was four years ago.
