Chrysanthemum Group Will Meet Tomorrow

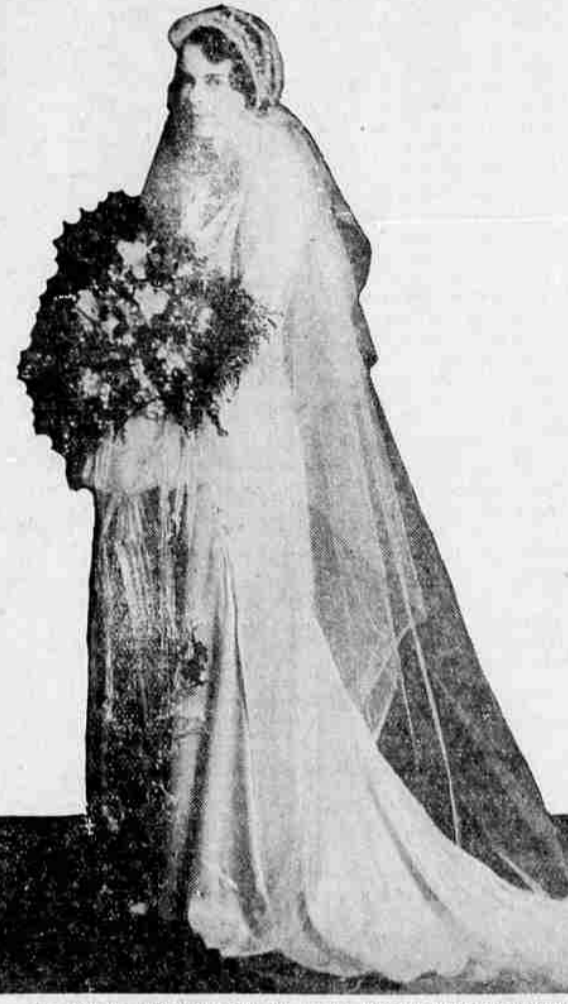
