

LOWER GRADES OF BUTTER ADVANCE, EGG TONE WEAKER

PORTLAND, March 17.—(AP)—Advances in the price of lower grade of score butter on the produce exchange during the last session did not indicate any material change in the general situation. It simply appeared that the sellers of lower score butter were going to take profits while able to do so. The big stores are taking all the undergrade butter offered and the public appears well satisfied.

Recent attempt to force artificial advances on butterfat in Portland have failed. Setback of egg prices was shown for the day as a result of continued shading of values. Most of the current weakness in the trade appears due to the peddling by producers direct to retailers.

While in some quarters buyers shades their bids for live chickens during the day, general feeling in the market was at least steady. Prices are therefore a trifle mixed. There is a mixed tone for dressed turkeys. Some buyers are taking 22c for No. 1 hens but little of the stock arriving can be placed in that grade, therefore such a price is very seldom available.

Increased buying of potatoes is reflected at Oregon country points for carload movement. Most of the local purchasers are around 50c with sacks furnished by the buyers. General strength is indicated at most leading American points.

Cabbage advanced to a new high today at \$4.50 per hundred pounds to retailers. This is for late California offerings.

OREGON EGG YIELD SHOWING INCREASE

CORVALLIS, Ore., March 17.—(AP)—Egg production in Oregon showed a 14 per cent increase during the past week, according to the weekly review issued today by the O.S.C. extension service and the U.S.D.A. bureau of agricultural economics, but the combined increase of the three coast states was sharply less than the seasonal increase of a year ago.

ROSEBURG BROCCOLI MOVING TO MARKET

PORTLAND, March 17.—(AP)—Choice Roseburg broccoli, or spring cauliflower, was rolling into the north and into the east today as the annual "big movement" got under way. The crop is expected to reach 100 carloads. Portland distributors declare the quality of the crop in general was never better than this season and the sizes are in demand.

MEDIC STUDENTS ADMIT STEALING WOMAN CORPSE

WALLA WALLA, Wash., March 17.—(AP)—Two California medical students, who were seeking a human skull for their studies, were blamed today for burying the corpse of a woman, which was found in a wheat field here two weeks ago. The two, Howard M. Ausherman of Loma Linda, and Chauceford A. Mounce of San Bernardino, have confessed the deed. Prosecutor Bernard J. Lehrer announced to California authorities. They attended Walla Walla college here last year. Questioning of the pair, he said, revealed they had taken it from a cemetery at Milton, Ore., on a night in December, 1930. They returned here with the body in a trunk and after failing at their dissecting, buried it hurriedly in a nearby field. The two were questioned, he said, by Stanley Muszell, San Bernardino district attorney. The case was turned over by Lehrer to C. C. Proebstel of Pendleton, prosecutor for Umatilla county, Ore.

HIGH SCHOOL PAPER ASKS STUDENTS FOR STORY CONTRIBUTION

The senior high school paper, the Hi-Times, is sponsoring a short story contest which is open to any high school student. The contest will run until the next issue of the paper, two weeks, or possibly longer. The stories may be on any subject of human interest, such as adventure, travel, or romance, and should be at least 5000 words in length, and preferably longer. The winning story will be run in the Hi-Times in the form of a continued story and will extend over several issues. This plan if successful will become a permanent feature of the high school paper, and if not used regularly these contests will be given from time to time. A large number of schools throughout Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Utah and California have used this plan and in those schools the student response has been large.

HOOVER DENIES DEBT REVISION CONTEMPLATED

WASHINGTON, March 17.—(AP)—A Democratic attack in the senate today against revision of the British war debt owed to America brought a denial from Senator Hoover (R., Pa.) on behalf of President Hoover that the subject was even under consideration.

Senator Reed specified that the "question had not been discussed" with Ambassador Mellon, who is about to sail for his London post. Senator Robinson, Arkansas, the Democratic leader, had quoted from a newspaper story published here today saying that Mellon was favorably inclined for revision of the British debt. He warned that any revision would be very carefully considered by congress.

After Senator Conally (D., Texas) challenged the administration to state its position Senator Reed, who had just returned to the floor said: "I am authorized to say that there is not a word of truth in the newspaper article."

Making Mistake

Declaring that the W.C.T.U. and the Anti-Saloon league were "making a mistake" in their battle against a referendum, the governor told the women that prohibition had failed to meet the expectations of its supporters and that the wisdom of continuing it should be submitted to the people for a final decision. He predicted the nation would remain dry unless a substantial substitute for prohibition is offered.

NIEDERMEYER IN FORECLOSE MOVE FEHL MORTGAGES

Suits for foreclosure of chattel and real estate mortgages against the Pacific Record-Herald, weekly newspaper; Earl H. Fehl, publisher; Mrs. Fehl, his wife; Roy Parr, game warden, and the Eagle Point Irrigation district, were filed yesterday by Geo. M. Roberts, attorney for Niedermeyer, Inc., a southern Oregon corporation, headed by L. Niedermeyer of the West Side district. The action is understood as a necessary procedure to protect the Niedermeyer interests in the Fehl property against the \$15,000 judgment awarded Officer Parr at the close of the libel suit against Mr. Fehl and the Pacific Record-Herald. The real estate mortgage held by Mr. Niedermeyer dates back to April 1, 1927, since which time Mr. Fehl has owed him \$3500, plus interest at seven per cent on the amount. The chattel mortgage on newspaper equipment is for \$4000, and dates back to 1924.

In addition to these suits, Mr. Niedermeyer asks payment of interest and attorney's fees. The Parr judgment, the complaint states, is subject to inferior and subordinate to the superior right and interest of the plaintiff, Niedermeyer. The lien of the irrigation company on the Fehl property is also inferior to the Niedermeyer title. It is stated. The newspaper was closed down Saturday night by the sheriff's office, after Judge H. D. Norton of the circuit court rescinded the 10 days' stay of execution at first granted the defendant in the libel suit.
