ASTORIA, Ore., March 18.—(AP)—A protest made against Walter Palmberg, star forward on the Astoria high school basketball team which is in the state tournament at Salem, was declared without foundation today by parents and players when word was received here that Emerson Sims, Portland attorney, had made a complaint to the state association.

Palmberg's parents exhibited a baptismal certificate signed by several witnesses showing his birth on March 7, 1912, making his present age 20 years. Sims is said to have declared he saw a birth certificate indicating Palmberg is 21 years old. Bill Palmberg, the player's brother, left today for Salem to show the certificate to interested persons before the game with Benson high of Portland tonight.

JOBLESS RELIEF NEEDED NOW IS WARNING TO CITY

Unemployment in the city of Medford is now at its peak, having reached a figure superior to that of all past records, Ensign J. R. Pack announced today at the meeting of the Allied Welfare Workers association at the Hotel Medford. There are 2200 men out of work, he stated, and many hungry families which must be fed.

Plans for a community-wide program to correct the problem are underway, he informed the organization, and named as representatives to serve on the committee, Mrs. Alice Coppin and Mrs. G. Q. Abint. He urged each member of the allied welfare group to carry back to her respective organization a statement of the present condition and a plea for aid.
