

LINDBERGH HOLDS SECRET CONCLAVE WITH POLICEMAN

(Continued from Page One) have reached Mexico by air before officials could stop them led to the order. The agents are working incognito.

HOPEWELL N. J., March 18.—(AP)—Police at the Lindbergh home announced today that the two Franklin Park servants who disappeared the day after the kidnaping of the Lindbergh baby had been located and were to be questioned.

They were cook and butler for the C. Leandro Lightfoots and the circumstance of their sudden departure caused the Lightfoots to make a report to police investigating the kidnaping.

They said the servants, known to them as Mr. and Mrs. Paul Thornburg, left with the statement that Thornburg's mother was dying in Germany. After they had come the Lightfoots missed some rough wood, similar to that used in the ladder employed by the kidnapers and a chisel like one found beneath the Lindbergh nursery window.

Locate Missing Pair. The chisel was found at the Lightfoot home yesterday.

The official bulletin issued today by Superintendent of State Police H. Norman Schwarzkopf, revealed that the investigation had resulted in location of the missing pair.

It also disclosed the servants were known to police by another name than Thornburg.

Henry Johnson (the author of the baby's nurse who was questioned at length about the kidnaping and who is held for immigration officials) has not been questioned by investigators from this office as to the whereabouts of Paul Engensternberg, alias Thornburg. Schwarzkopf's statement read:

Checking Story. "Our investigators are still out checking on the story related by Mr. Lightfoot and until such time as they return and report their findings, it will be impossible to inform you of anything definite concerning the case."

"Whether or not there is any connection between their sudden departure and the circumstance of the kidnaping is to be determined."

Two Newark detectives left this morning for Pocatello, Idaho, to question Ignace Blaustein, who told police there he was the driver of the automobile in which the Lindbergh baby was kidnaped.

Deputy Chief of Police Frank Rex of the Newark force said he spoke to Blaustein last night by telephone and his conversation was important enough to warrant sending men to Pocatello.

BOISE, Idaho, March 18.—(AP)—Ignace Blaustein, held in Pocatello on a burglary charge, gave police arresting him here a story which conflicted with much he told Pocatello officers later.

Blaustein, who gave also the name of Harry Schwartz, was questioned here regarding the Lindbergh kidnaping case and said he knew nothing of it until he reached Weber, Utah, on his way west from New Jersey.

Valentine stated that he was turning into a service station when the car driven by Allen Smith struck his auto.

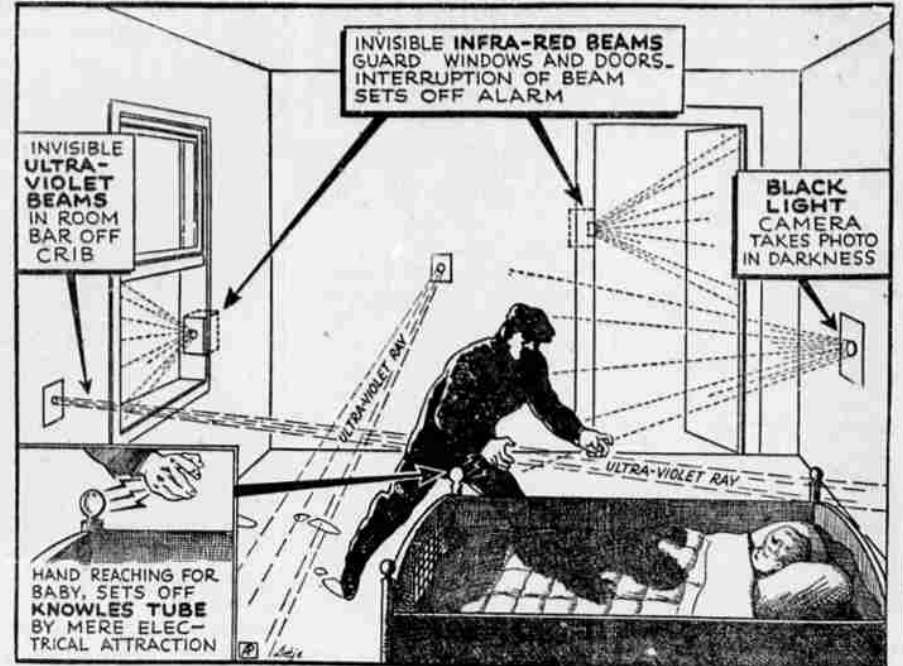
14 PEASANTS DROWN IN ICE OF DNEISTER

Science Uses "Black Light" As Invisible Policemen In Home To Foil Kidnapers



Above are shown methods science has devised to combat kidnapers. They include invisible rays playing through nursery which sound an alarm when interrupted by an intruder; a hidden camera which takes a plain photograph in darkness unknown to kidnapers; and an alarm tube which picks electric emanations from hand reaching for baby.

By HOWARD W. BLAKESLEE (Associated Press Science Writer) NEW YORK — (AP) — In "black light" science has a solution for protecting babies from kidnapers of the type who broke into the Lindbergh home.

Some of these protectors already are in use, invisible beams of two kinds of "black light"—infra-red and ultra-violet, which fall like protective bars around baby cradles.

Other devices, but which are not yet in use, would photograph the kidnaper plainly in pitch darkness.

There is also the Knowles tube, so sensitive that no beam nor contact is necessary. A kidnapers' hand reaching past one of these into the baby's crib would set off the tube by mere electrical capacity present in all human hands.

These devices are explained by Dr. Phillips Thomas, research engineer of the Westinghouse company.

"A number of wealthy men," he says, "have had their homes and offices equipped with photo-electric cell devices used in conjunction with ultra-violet light. These rays are invisible, both in lighted and darkened rooms, and therefore, it is impossible for an intruder to move about without being detected, as the rays can be placed at various angles."

"In a number of cases, every door and window of the home has been equipped with them. There are many duties that these 'electric eyes' can do as guardians; for instance, by placing these invisible beams preferably the infra-red ray type tube across a doorway or window, an intruder would, when passing thru, sound an alarm without knowing when or how he had done so."

"There are a number of cases where this invisible policeman is used as a protection of nurseries. This calls for a number of invisible light beams, each falling on a phototube, two of which are projected across a crib in which a child is sleeping."

"In one case the application is such that it can turn on, automatically, all the lights in the house and floodlight the entire grounds surrounding it."

"It is quite feasible to arrange so that a photograph of an intruder could be obtained without his knowledge. It would be a simple matter to set off a hidden camera with these invisible rays; thereby giving positive identification to the culprit."

The newest of all these possibilities was reported to the scientific world recently at Boston, a new photographic film so sensitive to infra-red that a flash took its own picture by its heat alone.

Had Poor Season. Forbra won only one race this season, previous to his triumph today, and that because of a disqualification. The seven-year old winner carried the light weight of 147 pounds and was ridden by Jockey John Haney.

Through the last half mile the race was a duel between Forbra and Egrement with Shaun Gollin far back out of contention for the winner's share of the 9000 pound purse.

Forbra took the last jump in front, but Egrement almost passed him in the run for the judges' stand. The seven-year-old jumper had enough left here, however, to beat Egrement by three lengths.

Heartbreak Hill was the only horse that figured in the official betting to finish the course. Sea Soldier was beautifully handled by Lex Wilson, Toronto jockey.

Millions Change Hands. The American-bred jumper fenced perfectly, keeping about the same position throughout. Frequently Wilson avoided collision with riderless horses by taking his mount wide.

K. C. B., which broke his leg at the water jump, was just ahead of Sea Soldier, when he fell.

With the crowd numbering more than 200,000, the largest in the history of the race, the classic attracted world-wide interest through the gigantic sweepstakes and the international radio hookup. Millions of dollars were won through the Irish hospital, the London stock exchange and other sweepstakes.

UNCLE SAM MAY TRY SALES DRIVE WHEAT, COTTON

WASHINGTON, March 18.—(AP)—Official contemplation of an "intensive sales campaign" by the United States to place some of the country's huge surplus of wheat and cotton in European and other countries was reported today by Secretary Hyde.

The agriculture secretary told newspapermen that although plans for such a campaign were at present nebulous, there was a definite "hope" that some such procedure could be followed in lifting the weight of these enormous surpluses from the American market.
