COPIOUS RAINFALL SPEEDING GROWTH VALLEY ORCHARDS

The abundant warm rains of last week and comparatively warm days and nights are not only bringing out pasture, lawns, shrubbery and early flowers, but are advancing fast the development of the early fruit trees.

Development of the pear clusters is being hurried and the soil saturated, which means untold benefits for the field and garden crops.

Already many clusters on early pear trees in favorable locations in some orchards are said to be opening, and only a few days and nights more of warm weather, especially like that of Friday night, will bring about a general opening of clusters.

Not only that but the copious rains and snow melting in the low mountains have filled all the streams. Creeks which had been dry for the past year or so are now running awfully. Bear creek and the Rogue river have risen greatly and are still rising, and the irrigation reservoirs are filling up. In fact, it was reported here yesterday that the Emigrant dam was overflowing, and other irrigation dams filling fast. Altogether, it looks like a good year for Jackson county crops. The majority of the spring plowing had been done and the ground seeded before last week's rainy spell began, and the only flaw in the wet weather omen is that those farmers who had not yet done their spring plowing and seeding will not only lose the benefit of the present moisture, but will be delayed in plowing until the ground dries out sufficiently to permit it.

Up to 4 p. m. yesterday the rainfall since last Sunday had amounted to 1.78 inches, which brings the seasonal rainfall since September 1 last to the above hour far above the average of the last 20 years for that period, and above the normal for the entire month of March.

Still more rain fell after 4 p. m. yesterday, and the outlook is for more tonight and today.

NOTED ARMY OFFICER FRIEND OF KLOCKERS SINCE EARLY YEARS

Colonel Hubert A. Allen, U. S. infantry, detailed as senior inspection officer for the Oregon National Guard, with headquarters at Portland, and who inspected the Medford units of the National Guard last Tuesday night, has had a notable military career, and has been a close friend of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Klockner for years, the trio having been reared in Independence, Iowa. Hence, on his rather frequent visits to this city on military business the three always find time for a social visit and reunion.

Colonel Allen is one of the few ranking U. S. army officers, who is not a graduate of West Point military academy, having started his military career in the National Guard of Iowa.

During the World war he was a major general in command of the 26th division, and was the only commanding general who took his division over to France to return with the same.

The colonel is one of the authori-

ties on military matters and is the author of several books on military tactics, including one on medieval war tactics. While Colonel Allen's formal report on his inspection of the Medford units may not become known for months yet, it is known that both Company A and the headquarters company passed a splendid inspection.

ORDER ACCOUNTING DEEP GRAVEL MINE

The Deep Gravel mine, on the east fork of the Illinois river, in

Josephine county, was ordered to shut down operations and the lessee, S. B. Potter and E. E. Potter, appeared before Judge Norton Saturday with documents to stand examination as to the amount of gold and platinum cleanups, in a court order and injunction issued late Monday by Judge Norton, upon complaint of the Deep Gravel Mine company and Alfred Evan Reames of Medford, owners of the property. It is charged that the Potters have defaulted in their payments since they took a lease on the mine in October, 1929.
