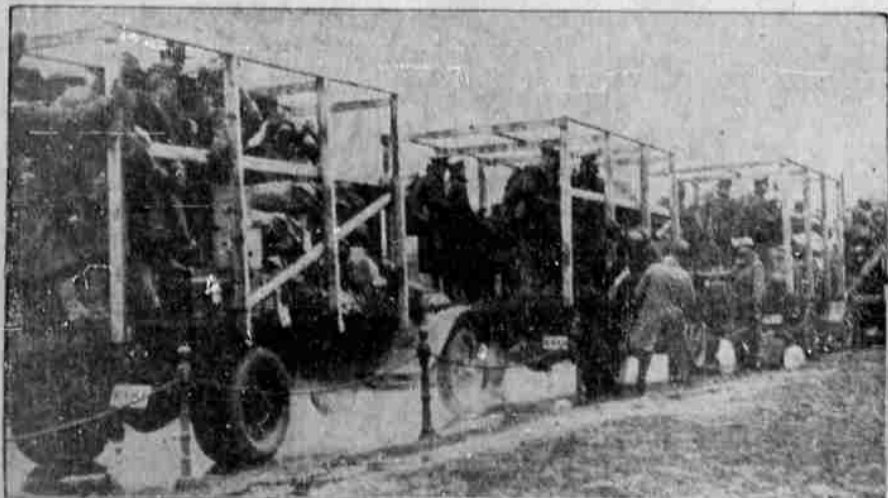
CHINOOK WIND BRINGS FLOOD, DEATH TO NORTHWEST

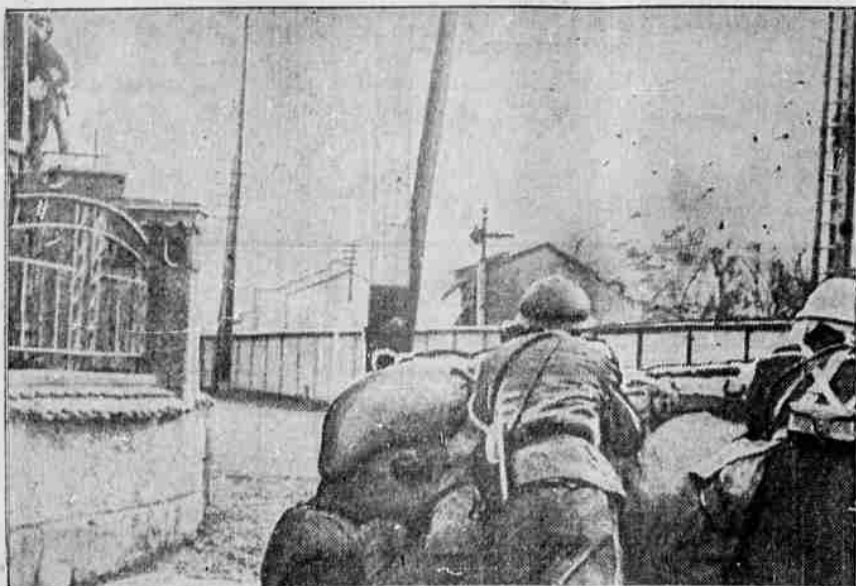
MARINES ARRIVE TO TAKE SITUATION IN HAND

Truckloads of marines rolling into Shanghai to protect American lives and property there during the Sino-Japanese hostilities. They landed from Manila.

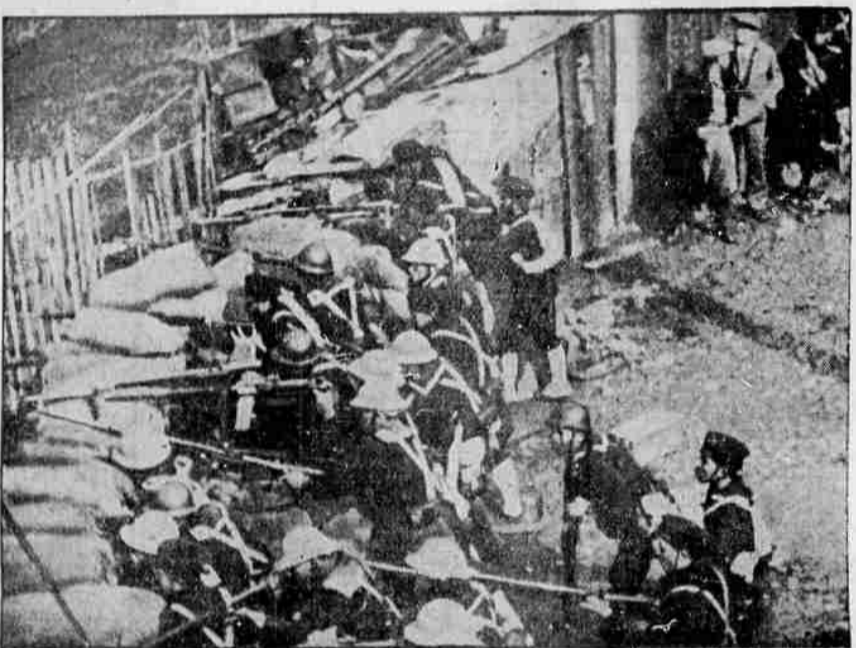
JAPANESE GUNNERS UNDER FIRE IN CHAPEI DISTRICT

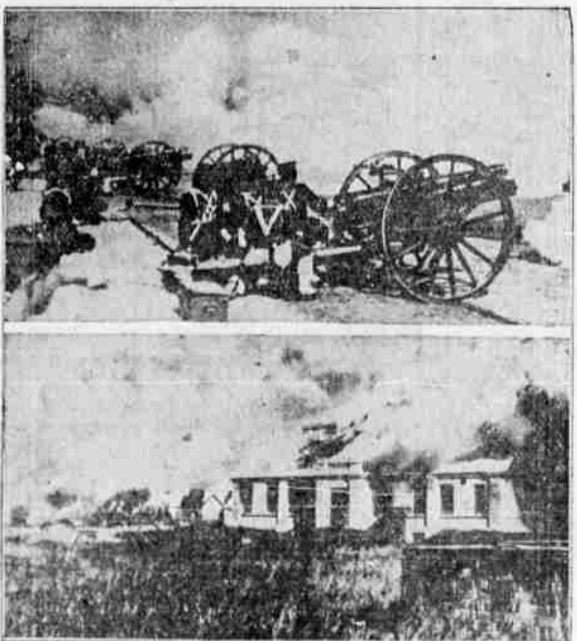
HER FIGHT KNOWS NO BOUNDS
