COMPACT KITCHEN MAKES LIFE EASY FOR MODERN WIFE

The modern housewife has been slower to take advantage of labor-saving devices and time-saving opportunities in the kitchen than she has anywhere else in her home.

Believes Miss Heister Hahn, noted home economist, whose personal appearance in Medford is being eagerly awaited by hundreds of local home makers.

With the installation of a strict kitchen system and the planning of mandatory meal hours, most housewives would find that there is no such thing as a drudgery in the kitchen, the economist declares.

Compact kitchens, even those of the smallest apartments, are now installed with the latest scientific devices, and modern cupboards that permit Mrs. Homemakers to be within reach of the maximum number of utensils and materials with the minimum amount of effort.

However, the average housewife has not yet installed enough of a system in her kitchen, Miss Heister believes.

"And," she says, "cooking becomes the simplest thing in the world when you have everything set just in the shape and order in which you want it, and spend just ten minutes in the morning planning what you are going to have for every meal that day.

The funny part about it is that arranging your kitchen and planning your meals makes fun, instead of drudgery!"

Miss Heister simply believes that the housewife should apply the same sort of methods to her kitchen and home making that the average business man applies in the mechanics of his own business.

Offices are now arranged to use a large number of simple, time-saving and labor-saving devices—most housewives can arrange their kitchens in just the same way.

The remark is often heard that "I wish I could get a meal with as little trouble as she does." However, declares Miss Heister, the "little trouble" referred to is usually the result of plans made ahead of time.

Women, to whom cooking seems an enjoyment and who get their meals in such a short time, are usually those who take a small amount of time in the morning just to plan out the meals for the day. Of course, for your party dinner, it would take planning considerably ahead of time, but the principle, according to Miss Heister, is all the same.

In fact, she declares, the mental attitude constitutes 50 per cent of the average woman's kitchen drudgery.

Miss Heister brings women of Medford a real message on March 30, 31 and April 1, 2 to 4 p. m., at the Holly theatre, aimed squarely at helping housewives in establishing better systems in their kitchens and in saving time and eliminating drudgery in their kitchen work.

This expert home economist declares that she feels a real thrill every time she takes the platform to go through her simple outline program of cookery. She says that cooking is a real art and that if the housewife attacks her task with a spirit of dread her work is bound to be poor.

If she feels the thrill and intriguing capacity of cooking, her meals are bound to be much better and she will get a great deal more enjoyment out of preparing them.

She has one hatred, she revealed. "I wish I knew what sophistication is," she said. "I'd keep it out of my shows forever."
