

FEHL'S PROPERTY KEPT INTACT BY ORDER OF COURT

The circuit court late yesterday issued an order, at the request of Niedermeyer, Inc., directing that the sheriff hold the Pacific Record-Herald equipment and building and the personal property of Earl H. Fehl, its editor, in "status quo," pending further orders of the court. The plant was recently closed under a judgment execution, as the result of a favor suit award of \$15,000 in favor of Roy H. Parr, game warden. Niedermeyer, Inc., holds a mortgage against the plant. The situation is now in somewhat of a legal stalemate.

Arguments on the motion for a new trial filed by Fehl's attorneys are expected to be heard next week by the circuit court.

The defense now claims that Anderson Mee, one of the libel suit jurors, is not a resident of Jackson county, but instead resides just across the line in Josephine county in the Thompson creek country. Mee, his friends say, always thought he lived in this county. It will be one of the grounds presented by the defense for a new trial.

COURT HOUSE STONE ARRIVES THIS WEEK FROM INDIANA MINE

Indiana limestone for the new county court house is due to arrive the end of the week and work of placing it in position will start as soon as possible thereafter, according to Harry Porter, inspector of the works for the county court. At a conference with the county court this morning Porter was given authority for handling of the job and his recommendations were followed. Inspector Porter informed the court that as near as he could ascertain there were only two stonecutters residing in Jackson county and that it would be necessary to hire two non-resident stonecutters. There will be a stone foreman, whose duties will consist of seeing that the stone-cut to specifications, is properly placed. The limestone slabs are all numbered. Inspector Porter declared that unless a stone-cutter and mason were experienced, a "botched-up job" would result.

Work of constructing the jail on the roof and installing the partitions between the rooms on the ground floor has been started. Inspector Porter said practically all the men employed were bona-fide Jackson county residents, and that the number varied according to the work in hand. He said only three men were employed, and they had dependents.

STEIWER WORKING FOR FEDERAL AID FOR UNEMPLOYED

Senator Frederick Steiwer today advised the county court in a telegram that he was taking steps toward securing federal employment aid for this state, and that there was nothing definite to report.

Senator Steiwer is supporting the federal emergency road aid bill, for an appropriation of \$125,000,000, and it is expected to come to a vote in congress at the end of the week. Under the appropriation Oregon would be allotted more than \$3,000,000 for federal road work.

Senator Steiwer assured the county court he appreciated the seriousness of the situation and was doing all he could to secure relief. According to County Engineer Paul Rynning, 91 men are now employed on county relief work, and it is hoped to continue the work for another month or six weeks. An effort is being made by the counties of the state, to have the highway commission continue financial assistance in the work. It is expected that by June 1, employment will be available for some of the jobless on federal road work.

Twenty-two hundred men are registered as unemployed in this county. A check is now under way to determine how many of this number are possessed of modest means and how many are in need.

YOUTHS IN JAIL AS CAR THIEVES

Donald Chappell and Leslie Johnson, each 21 years old, are held in the county jail, following their arrest last night by the state police for possession of a stolen auto, and endeavoring to defraud a service station keeper. They are held for Klamath Falls authorities.

The youths are alleged to have stolen a Ford coupe yesterday belonging to G. W. Matern of Klamath Falls and last night to have secured eight gallons of gasoline at the Harbin Service station at Ashland and to have fled. They were pursued by state police who captured them after a wild drive north on the Pacific Highway.

PARR GIVEN TIME TO OPPOSE FEHL'S RE-TRIAL MOTION

Roy H. Parr, game warden, through his attorney, Allison Moulton, was today granted until next Saturday to file counter-affidavits and resist the motion of the Pacific Record-Herald, and its editor, Earl H. Fehl, to secure a new trial. Parr was recently awarded a \$15,000 libel verdict against the paper and its editor.

Attorney Moulton sets forth that affidavits have been filed by the Pacific Record-Herald and Editor Fehl, attacking the plaintiff, his attorney and members of the jury and it is necessary to file counter-affidavits to "establish the truth." Attorney Moulton also sets forth in his plea that the motion for a new trial with seven affidavits attached was not served upon him in person, but was shoved through a mail-slot in the door of his office, where it lay on the floor while Attorney Moulton was conducting a lawsuit in Grants Pass.

MOTTLED TEETH STRANGE MALADY DISCOVERED HERE

numerous cases the teeth finally assume a very unattractive yellow color. This affliction, according to Prof. Reimer, however, develops only in children who drink caustative waters while the permanent teeth are erupting, between the ages of six and 12 years. Such teeth remain permanently affected.

Fluorine is the most active of all known elements. It cannot be retained in glass bottles as it destroys the glass. A compound of fluorine is used in etching glass, such as glass thermometers. The two local cases found by Prof. Reimer have developed where the drinking water comes from wells several hundred feet deep. One of these wells contains five parts and the other eight parts of fluorine in a million parts of water. The Medford city water contains far less than one part per million and this small amount

will never cause mottled teeth, according to Prof. Reimer.

Last summer Professor Reimer made the highly important discovery that the waters from very deep wells in this valley cause very severe burning and shedding of foliage when used in spraying fruit trees. These wells have been abandoned as sources of spray water. It is highly interesting that cases of mottled teeth found here have developed where the water from these same wells was used for drinking purposes. Dentists present at the meeting expressed intense interest, and complimented Prof. Reimer on his important discovery. These dentists and the county health officer agreed to report all suspicious cases of mottled teeth to Prof. Reimer, and an analysis will be made of the drinking water used by such persons.
