YOUTH IS SLAIN TRYING PROTECT GIRL COMPANION

SAN FRANCISCO, March 24.—(AP)—A 20-year-old girl, terrified almost to the point of collapse, this morning sobbed out a story of how her 21-year-old companion, Paul Herman Hanson, was shot and killed by two men on a lonely road near here last night.

The girl, Miss Alice Olson, a stenographer, told police the youth was killed as he resisted efforts of the two men to assault her.

As Hanson fell before the fire from the men's guns, she said she fled amid a hail of bullets and managed to elude pursuit by hiding in a field. She crept to a highway and stopped a passing motorist.

The youth's body was found by police near the automobile in which Miss Olson said they had driven to the spot. They had been keeping company for the past 18 months, she said.

The girl told police they were sitting in the parked automobile when two men, one armed with a rifle and the other with a pistol, suddenly appeared beside the car.
