

# DRY ICE FACTORY POSSIBILITY HERE EYED BY C. OF C.

Investigation of possibilities for developing a dry ice plant here was started today at a meeting of the industrial committee of the chamber of commerce with Frank E. Hobson, engineer of Portland.

The supply of raw material available, such as gases in natural mineral springs in this district, and carbon dioxide in lime deposits, will be investigated with the possibility of marketing, both the dry ice and quick lime, the product to be manufactured from the residue if the lime process is adopted.

Engineer Hobson has basic patents on the refining process for both the quick lime and carbon dioxide gas.

A. W. Pipes is chairman of the committee making the investigation, which it is hoped will terminate in an important industry for southern Oregon. Lime deposits in this territory are plentiful. The growing demand for dry ice has inspired the local committee to investigate the possibilities of converting natural resources into the manufacture of the product.

## Brake Adjustment Offered by Allen As Aid to Safety

## EXTEND ENGLEHARDT RETRIAL PLEA TIME

An order granting Prof. C. Englehardt 10 days additional time in which to file motion for a new trial was granted Saturday by Circuit Judge H. D. Norton. Prof. Englehardt, well known resident of the Eagle Point district, was sentenced to pay a fine of \$250 upon conviction of assault and battery upon John Domegalla, a neighbor, last October, in a fight that followed an argument over amount of damages to be paid for the Englehardt home getting into the Domegalla field.

Carl Steider, nephew of Professor Englehardt, found guilty of the same charge, was given a sentence of 30 days in the county jail, and upon a recommendation for leniency, paroled to the district attorney.

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# GARNER TO WARN SGLONS ON NEED BALANCE BUDGET

Into a tariff measure and finally succeeded in turning back the flood of such proposals.

May Make Appeal

Speaker Garner renewed his assertions the budget must be balanced at his morning conference with newspapermen and indicated he might take the floor tomorrow to appeal to the house to pass a tax bill that would accomplish this.

"I advocated the sales tax because I thought it was the easiest way to balance the budget as a temporary measure," he said, "but the house did not care for that kind of tax. We will have to turn to other taxes to get the revenue to balance the budget."

Exchange May Suffer

Unless the budget is balanced foreign exchange will depreciate and I don't know what would happen. You would find the dollar would be affected in foreign exchange."

Asked whether there is growing sentiment in the house to permit the senate to draft the revenue bill, Garner said:

"I hope not."

The Texan said he would make a strenuous fight in order to get enough revenue to meet the running expenses of the government.

"If you were in England or France or Italy or in any other country where the government was running behind in its operating expenses \$5,000,000 a day and no effort was made by the government to meet the situation you wouldn't keep your money in that country," Garner said.

"You would get it out of that country. The same thing might apply to this country unless the budget is balanced."
