BANDITS OVERAWE BANK PERSONNEL; MAKE HUGE HAUL

24 Forced Lie On Floor of Minneapolis Institution As Armed Men Take \$50,000 in Cash and Securities
MINNEAPOLIS, March 29.—(AP)—Seven bandits, four carrying sub-machine guns, held up 24 persons in an outlying bank and escaped with \$50,000 in cash, \$125,000 in securities left for safekeeping and an undetermined amount left for collateral for loans.

MORE AFFIDAVITS FILED FOR FEHL'S NEW TRIAL PLEA

Fehl, its editor, as supporting legal steps in their motion for a new trial in the libel suit instituted by Roy Parr, game warden of Ashland, wherein he was awarded a \$15,000 general and punitive verdict. The amended affidavits were filed on stipulation between opposing counsel.

ROOSEVELT FINDS FINANCIAL HELP SMITH'S ATTITUDE AIM IN MEETING POLITICAL PUZZLE FRUIT INTERESTS

BOSTON, March 29.—(AP)—Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt is puzzled by the failure of Alfred E. Smith to support his presidential campaign, according to James Roosevelt, son of the New York governor. Speaking at a series of Roosevelt rallies last night, the younger Roosevelt reviewed the friendship extending for many years between his father and Smith, and said: "Neither father nor his close friends can understand at this time the failure of Governor Smith to support his candidacy."
