CRESCENT BOOM MERELY HOT AIR WITNESSES AVER

The still crest of Alden Hughes against the Crescent City Investment company and the American Surety company for collection of \$800 he assertedly remitted for the purchase of lots at Crescent City, Cal., will be concluded late today. The Crescent City Investment company is not contesting the action but the American Surety company is opposing the suit on the grounds it is not liable. The amount represented is approximately \$5000.

A dozen Jackson county and Medford investors, in the development project who paid sums ranging from \$25 up to \$1000 yesterday afternoon and this morning.
