Finally Harry (Happy) Puller, sleeping nearest to a window, got up and quietly raised it about two feet, but on beholding a big black bear several feet in front of him, suddenly alarmed the window down again so hard that it mashed his hand, which he forgot to draw back.

Chas. Simpson and Don Fisher, rangers, and Blackie, the cook, immediately joined Happy at the window, but Gordon Warner, who sleeps when he sleeps, only turned over and resumed snoring. The quartet then ineffectually endeavored to coax the bear inside, with the intention of having him share Gordon's bed.

ORDER CHANGE IN UTILITIES' BOOKS

SALEM, March 30.—Accounting practices of utility companies in Oregon, operating merchandising and jobbing departments in addition to utility service, must follow the accounting form of other merchandising firms handling similar products, the utilities commission ordered today. The new rule will become effective April 1.

The matter came to the attention of the commission by protest of the Oregon Merchants Utility Bureau, involving the merchandising and jobbing accounting of gas and electrical utilities. Twelve utility companies, all major firms in Oregon, were named defendants in the action. Hearings continued from January 21 until February 6 before commission.

PARK SNOW PICTURES WILL BE FEATURES OF FRIDAY COOK'S CLASS

Winter scenes in Crater Lake national park are an attraction at the Holly theatre for the remainder of the week beginning this evening with two performances nightly. The films will be accompanied by a lecture given by Harry Good, local radio announcer, explaining different views and giving forth general information on southern Oregon's scenic gem.

The development of snow removal operations in the park and the use of the present high powered equipment are shown in the first reel, including the opening of the deepest drift in the park behind "The Watchman's" first high point of the west rim. The drift, estimated to be over 45 feet deep this year. Through the use of the snow plows, it will be possible to open the park to travel some time this month, enabling motorists to drive between snowbanks from five to 15 feet in height, surrounded by miles of superb winter scenery.

Reflection pictures of the crater walls, the water resembling a mirror so perfectly that the point where the crater wall ends and the lake begins, cannot be determined, are a feature of the second reel, a portion of which was taken during a boat trip taken by the snow crew in winter. Striking views are countless and provide scenes not to be readily forgotten, including pictures of the lodge and rim area in winter.

The films will also be shown tomorrow afternoon during the Mail Tribune cooking school.

STATE POLICE STOP WILDCAT STAGE HERE; OPERATOR IS FINED

Another Filipino wildcat stage operator, Ciriano G. Episcopo, came to grief yesterday when, after being arrested by state police for not having Oregon license plates, nor a non-resident permit from Oregon, was fined \$50 and costs in Judge Taylor's court and the police seized his car to retain it until he obtained the proper license.

Episcopo's passengers, two women who had paid \$15 fare each from Salinas, Cal., to Salem, Ore., and two children, for whom half-fares were paid, were taken to hotels until the stage might be permitted to proceed north, or they made arrangements to go on to Salem in some other conveyance.

Episcopo claims it was his first trip carrying passengers, but the police say he made at least one such previous trip some time ago.

ISAAC W. BERRY PASSES, AGED 81

Isaac Wilson Berry passed away at his home, 412 King street, early Wednesday morning, after a long illness. He was born in Delhi, Ind., March 18, 1851, the son of Alexander and Mary Berry, an early pioneer family of 1852.

He served as a lieutenant in the Modoc Indian war, and was deputy warden of the Oregon state penitentiary from 1898 to 1904. He was a man of high scholarly attainments and long a resident of Jacksonville and Medford. He leaves one daughter, Laura Berry of this city, and one sister, Mrs. Mary A. Delamater of Portland.

Funeral services will be held at the Peck Funeral Home, Friday at 2:30 p. m. Rev. William B. Hamilton officiating. Interment in Jacksonville cemetery.

Mack Oliver Brown died at a local hospital Monday evening from pneumonia, aged 89 years. He was a native of Kansas and a resident of Central Point for the past 14 years.

He was a member of the Central Point Grange and the Federated church, and leaves eight children: Dwight, San Francisco, Cal.; Coy, Schenectady, N. Y.; Mac, Vermillion, Alberta, Canada; Theron, Medford; Jerry, Central Point; Mrs. W. H. Ahrendt, Beaumont, Cal.; Genera and Jean Brown of Central Point.
