SON OF FOUNDER OF GRANTS PASS IS LAID TO REST

PORTLAND, Ore., March 31—(AP)—Thomas F. Croston, 82, who fathered the town of Grants Pass, was buried here today.

He died Monday at his home here. Croston, member of a pioneer Oregon family, was born in Illinois in 1850. His parents and relatives crossed the plains two years later. Ravaged by Indians the train abandoned the proposed California trip to take the Oregon Trail, short of horses and food.

The elder Croston wintered with his family in Salem in 1852 and later established in the Grants Pass vicinity. He built a stage depot in 1868 or 1867, and established a post office which he named Grants Pass after consulting with John Wheeler, J. P. Tuffa and Ben Mench. He also gave the ground for the Grants Pass cemetery and for a school there.

PARK CREW AGAIN SETS TO WORK IN REMOVING DRIFTS

Work of getting the entrance roads in Crater national park clear of snow, which ceased several days ago until a snow storm then on had distended, will be resumed tomorrow with the return to the park of Martin Plummer, chief mechanic, and Rudy Luck and Silin Prescott, members of the plow crew, accompanied by Frank Solinsky, who arrived here yesterday from San Francisco.

When the work left off recently the clearing of the Medford entrance road, working this way from Anna Spring camp, had only progressed to White Horse, about four or five miles this side of the Anna Spring camp. While the Klamath entrance road is cleared for a larger distance both entrance roads will be thrown open to travel about the same time.

The deep snow of the winter and the recurrence of snow storms the past two weeks greatly delayed the road clearing work and prevented those roads being opened by April 1, as had been planned.

If no more snow falls and the weather keeps clear it is expected that it will take 10 days from tomorrow to get the road in shape for travel. Tomorrow morning the snow plow will resume the work of clearing, in 10 feet of snow at White Horse.

No definite date has been set for the time of opening the park roads to travel, but the park officials declare that it will be as soon as possible.
