## FROM GEORGIA TO BROADWAY



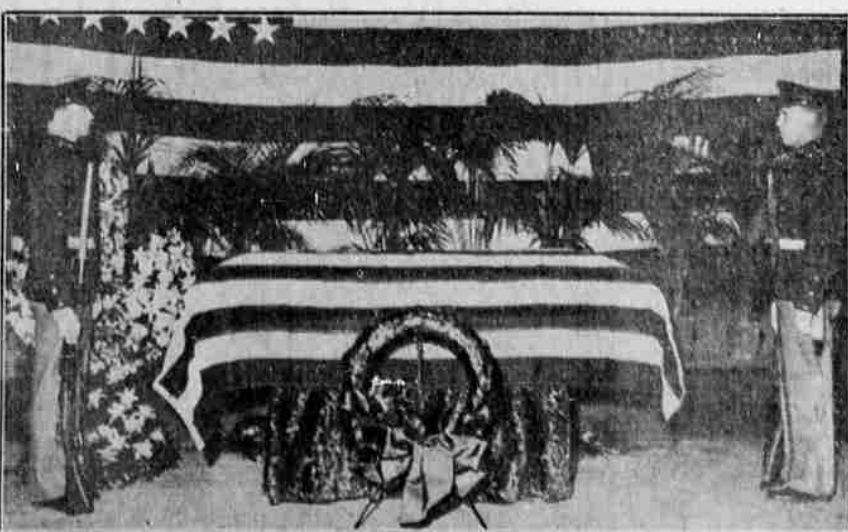

## FIRST TO CROSS SIERRA IN WINTER



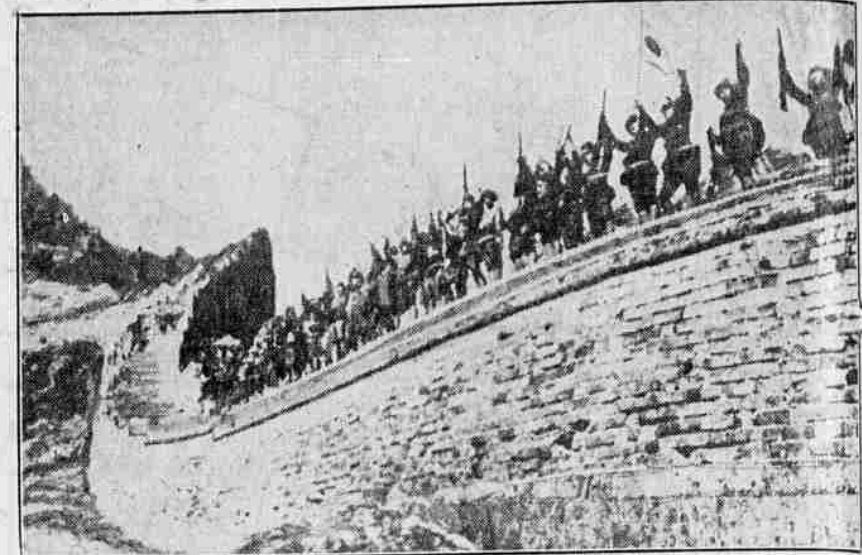

## Joins The Braves



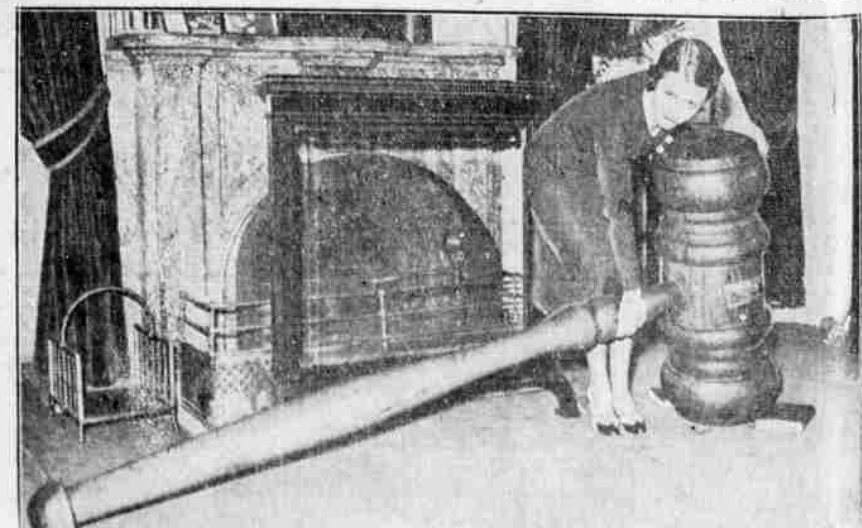
