Miss Brannan has spoken in 15 states of the union to 50,000 people. She attended the assembly of the League of Nations in Geneva in 1929 and served her country as a representative of the Y. W. C. A. in the trenches of France during the World War.

She is a descendant of Richard Dana, who in 1840 came to Cambridge Mass. from England, and of Chas. Dana, late editor of the New York Sun.

Educated in the United States and England, she is exceptionally well informed and a brilliant speaker. She relates her experiences in vivid language, which instills in her listeners the feeling that they too have lived them.
